In old Cork beside the Lee!



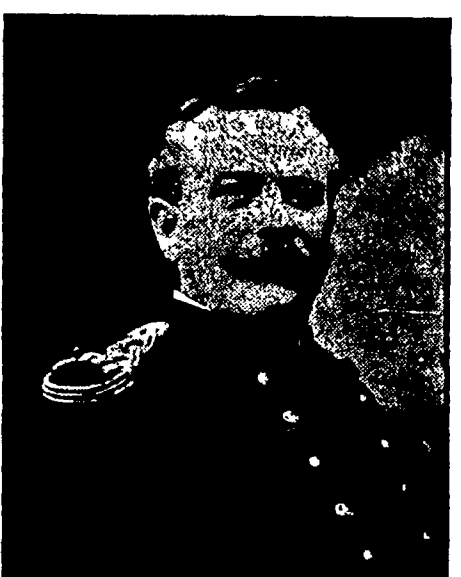

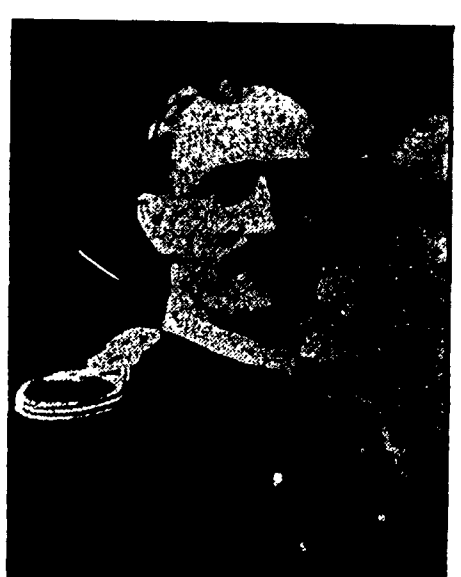

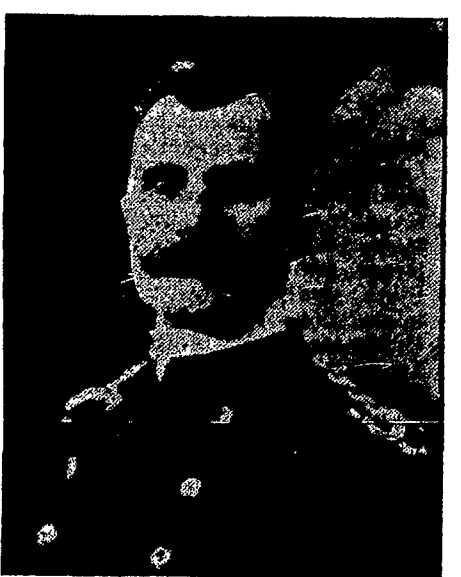
