Miss Elizabeth Magivern and Edward McWhoters were united in marriage Wednesday evening at the Immaculate Conception Church by Rev. Father Eckel.

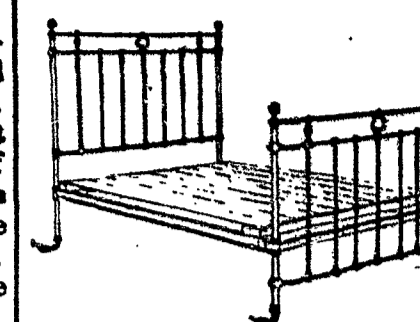

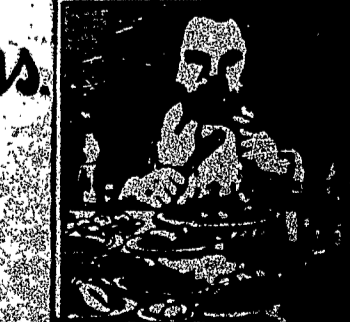
