CATH EDRAL.

To-day, July 12th, is Rt. Rev. Bernard J McQuaid's 34th anniversary The celebration has been post-poned for to morrow, Sunday, July 13th, when the Rt. Rev. Bishop will celebrate high mass at 10:30 o'clock in the Cathedral.

The change will be appreciated by all Catholics. Saturday is a very inconvenient day for clergymen as well as for laymen. While Sunday will prevent many of the clergy of the diocese from being present, the day at least has the advantage of giving the laity of the Cathedral parish and others outside of the parish the privilege of joining their bishop in praying for his welfare and the prosperity of the diocese of Rochester.

The event is made particularly interesting this year as a new magnificent organ, which has been in course of construction for the last six months and is now set up just ready for use, will be used for the first time. It was built by W W. Kimball & Co., of Chicago. Very Rev. Thomas F. Hickey, V. G., has worked indefatigably to procure an instrument worthy of the Cathedral and his work has been crowned with entire success. The organ has been bought directly from the factory. Although costing much less it is a more up to date organ than week. any other at present in the city of Rochester.

Very Rev Father Hickey and St. Patrick's Cathedral parish in responding so generously with the necessary funds are to be congratulated. No debts will be incurred by the purchase of this large organ.
