FOR A CATHOLIC CHAPEL.

Bishop Aids Funds for Construction of One at Bath Soldiers' Home.

Bishop McQuaid has addressed the following letter to the rectors of all churches in the diocese of Rochester: New York has established a home for the veterans of the late war at Bath, Steuben county.

There are about eighteen hundred inmates at this home, of which about one-third, or six hundred, are Catholic. Few of them are under 60 years of age, and most of them are between 60 and 90. A such an advanced period of life deaths are frequent, and often sudden, needing the constant attendance of a chaplain.

It is a small recompense for these old veterans who, ventured all for the preservation of the Union, when its destruction was sought, to give them the comfort of their religion in the closing days of their lives. Many of them are pious men who will appreciate the benefits of their religion.

Lately the trustees of the home have made provisions for two resident chaplains, one Catholic, and one non-Catholic. There is on the grounds a small church in which mass can be celebrated at some specified time on Sunday morning. What is needed is a chapel in which mass can be offered up on week-days, in which the blessed sacrament can be kept, and to which the old soldiers can come at any hour for prayer and devotions and the sacraments.

It is proposed to build this chapel in connection with the chaplain's house. Both house and chapel are now in process of construction and will be ready for use in September. They are placed between the church and the hospital. As there are usually about four hundred in the hospital, it is an advantage to have the Catholic chaplain close by.

It is only a small offering I ask of my generous people for this worthy purpose. No one regrets the 25 cents given for the Home for Epileptics; no one will begrudge 25 cents for the religious care of the old warriors who saved the life of the nation. I have such confidence in the goodness of the work, and in the good-will and generosity of the Catholics of the diocese of Rochester, that I have not hesitated to go on with the building without waiting for the money. If my previous appeal in the name of sweet charity met with so noble an answer, I am sure that this one in the name of true patriotism will not be unheeded. Reverend pastors will have the kindness to distribute these collections cards among some of the willing and zealous workers in their parish, and remit returns therefrom to Very Rev. T. F. Hickey, V. G., acting treasurer for this fund.
