THE "BLINDFOLD DRIVE." King Stanley of the Elks Carnival To Perform a Wonderful Feat.

A free public exhibition of the "blindfold drive" is to be given in Rochester at 12:30 o'clock to-day as a preliminary feature of the Elks midsummer carnival which is to be held all of next week at Ontario Beach Park.

King Stanley advance agent of the Aztec Twins and the Crystal Maze, will, blindfolded, drive a team of horses through the streets of the city in search of a hidden key to a certain postoffice box. With this key he will unlock the box, take therefrom a certain letter and, driving to the address written thereon, will deliver it to the person to whom it is addressed. He will be blindfolded throughout the entire feat.

A committee of representatives will prepare the letter, place it in the box with other letters and secrete the key. They will accompany Mr. Stanley on his "blindfold drive." The hour of 12:30 o'clock Saturday has been selected so as to accommodate the crowds on the holiday and who will wish to see the curious spectacle of a blindfolded man skillfully guiding a team of horses through the streets. In Dayton, Ohio where Mr. Stanley recently performed this feat, the public curiosity was so great that 40,000 people gathered in the streets to see him. The start will be made from Powers Hotel.
