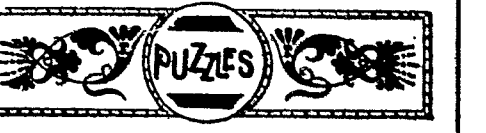
At the Sacred Heart Convent.
