In accidentally falling from one of the porches of the seminary Father Hart landed on his head. The fall caused him to become unconscious and he was removed to St. Mary's Hospital. He received a severe scalp wound, and unless unforeseen complications ensue he will recover. He was at the hospital for several hours before he recovered consciousness.

No. 1—Turn picture so left side is down. Head of bell ringer is behind boy, the nose outlined by his left foot. Assistant is between boy and girl his face outlined by boy's right leg.

No. 2—Invert picture. Head of woman is between boy and side of picture, her nose at his knee. Head of man is formed by boy's arm, his nose at boy's shoulder.

No. 3—Turn left side of picture down. Frenchman's head over roof of building, outlined by roof projections and dotted lines. Invert picture to find wife. Her face is formed by girl's face, the nose at her chin. Turn right side down to find boy. His face is at side of statue.

No. 4—Invert picture. Head of caretaker faces fireplace, the features outlined by footstool and poriere at door.

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
