Daniel J. Sullivan died Sept. 17th at his home, 315 South Fitzhugh St. His funeral was held Sept. 19th with solemn high mass. Father Eckel being celebrant assisted by Fathers Finley and McCabe. Mr. Sullivan was a well known traveling man. He was born at Bantry, County Cork, Ireland, in 1864 and came to this country when very young and located in Geneva, where he was in business for many years. He is survived by his mother and sister Hannah, of Bantry, sisters, Mrs. John Connors, of Geneva; Mary and Bridget, of this city, and one brother Robert, who resides in the west.

ST. JOSEPH.

Funeral services over the remains of Louis W. Maier, the well known undertaker, who died at his home, No. 50 Buchanan park, on Saturday, were held Tuesday morning. The funeral procession left the house at 8:30 o'clock and the remains were conveyed to St. Joseph's church, where solemn high mass was celebrated at 9 o'clock. The celebrant of the mass was Rev. Leonard Schwab, C. S. R. The church was crowded with the many friends of the deceased who had gathered to pay their tribute of respect. In the sanctuary were Very Rev. Thomas F. Hickey, V. G., rector of the Cathedral, Rev. E. J. Hanna, D. D., Rev. Emil Gefell, D. D., Rev. M. J. Hargather, rector of St. Michael's Church and Rev. Philip Krieg.

The honorary bearers were boys from St. Joseph's Orphan Asylum, which Mr. Maier had befriended greatly during his life. The active bearers were chosen from members of St. Francis' Society of SS. Peter and Paul's Church. St. Michael's Branch Catholic Mutual Benefit Association, and the Catholic Benevolent League, of which organizations Mr. Maier was a member. Interment was at Holy Sepulchre cemetery.

Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock the cornerstone of the clubhouse of the Young Men's Society of St. Joseph's church was laid with appropriate ceremonies. All the members of the society were present and the blessing was given by Rev. William Kessel, rector of this church. Under the stone was laid a box of dainty workmanship. This contained copies of the city papers and a history of the club's years ago, together with the names of the present 107 members. The proposed structure is on Chatham street and will cost \$15,000. The building will be ready for use about Thanksgiving.

After the laying of the corner stone the members adjourned to Glen Haven for their annual picnic, which a large

crowd attended and there was "something doing" all the time. Everybody went home tired and well pleased with the day.

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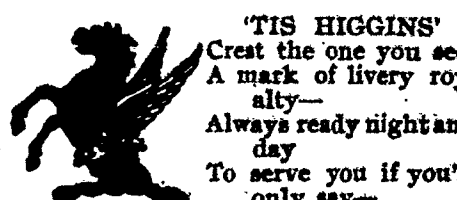

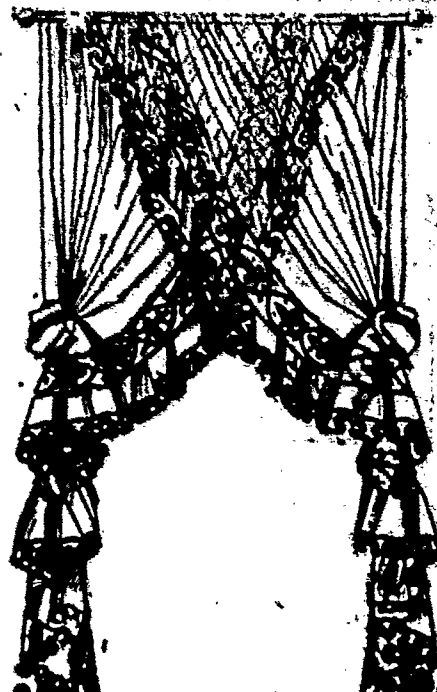
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
