EUGENE J. DWYER.

The Popular Candidate for Member of Assembly of the Third District.

Eugene J. Dwyer, who was nominated for member of the Assembly by the Republicans of the Third District, is one of Rochester's rising young lawyers.

He is a son of the late Michael Dwyer, who for many years was a well known and honored resident of Rochester and was engaged in the wagon making business until his death. Mr. E. J. Dwyer was born on Vienna St., Feb. 12th, 1872, and resided there until two years ago when he married the eldest daughter of the late John Connell, formerly of the firm Connell and Dengler.

Mr. Dwyer is one of the most prominent members of St. Bridget's Church. He received his early education in its parochial school and graduated from the high school. After a brief period spent at the University of Rochester Mr. Dwyer entered upon the study of law.

Mr. Dwyer's first public office was as second assistant corporation counsel. His record in this position was such that he was promoted. He had charge of many important matters for the city and was adviser to the law and assessment committee of the Common Council.

Mr. Dwyer's interest in Catholic affairs is not confined to the affairs of St. Bridget's Church alone. He is a member of the K. of C., A. O. H. and many other Catholic organizations.
