Key to last week's puzzles:

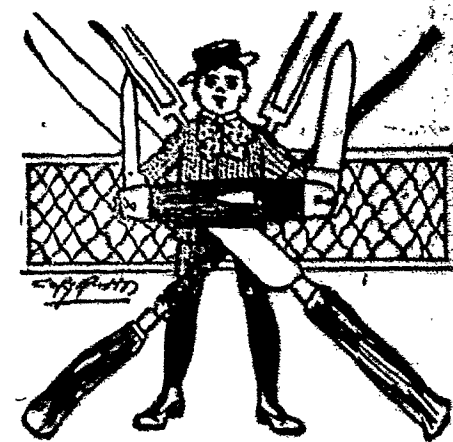
No. 1—Invert picture. Head of mandarin is between boy and girl, features outlined by boy's sleeve and dress.
