On Tuesday, Nov. 24th, the New York Central will sell excursion tickets to Boston, Springfield, Palmer, Worcester and South Framingham, July 810 round trip, limit ten days returning. No more appropriate place could be selected for a Thanksgiving Day vacation than New England, where our forefathers dwelt. Musical Insects. More than 1,000 persons in Japan make a good living by breeding, training and selling what are known as "singing insects". Like crickets these insects are and their Japanese names are kashabari and sumimushi. The insects which they make resemble that of a silver bell and, though rare in specimens, is very clear in tone. The Japanese keep the insects in bamboo cages and take great care of them as American bird fanciers do of their other pet birds. Some of them prefer the music which is made by a certain species of frog, known as kajika, and they are always ready to pay a high price for frogs which are well bred and well trained.

Warmed Up Meats. To make warmed up meats appetizing there are various commodities which ought to always occupy a place in the pantry. Have a small jar of onion butter, a bottle of caramel, a glass can filled with browned flour, a jar of truly rolled bread-crumbs, Worcestershire sauce, celery salt, may, bay leaves, a bottle of Oscar sauce, tabasco, cayenne, curry, catchup, canned mushrooms, paprika, kitchen bouquet and horse-radish. The secret of appetizing food is good flavoring, and a frequent varying of flavor has more to do with a tempting table than a large leather bill.
