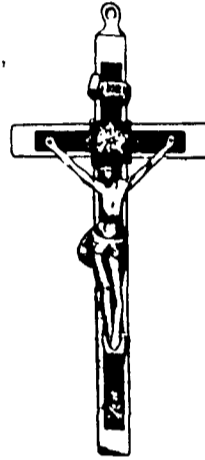

LEINSTER

CARLOW.—A meeting of the Baginbally Branch of the United Irish League was held Nov. 2. The members appointed to collect for the Defence Fund in the different districts banded in a large amount of money.
 The first meeting after its recent formation, of the County Carlow Divisional Executive U. I. L., was held in the Town Hall, Carlow. The president, Mr. Hammond, M. P., occupied the chair, and in his address said he would only say a few words. He congratulated them on the fact that they had set up in the county a divisional executive, which was representative of the county, and of all sections. When he said all sections he meant the farmers, traders, laborers and all the middle class people.
DUBLIN.—Mr. J. A. O'Sullivan, United Irish League organizer, was arrested Nov. 6, outside the residence of the Lord Mayor of Dublin. He was sentenced in September to four months' imprisonment for alleged intimidation and conspiracy, contained in a speech delivered at Templemore, County Tipperary. Mr. O'Sullivan was hourly anticipating arrest. As he was along to the Mansion House to attend the meeting he protested against such a proceeding taking place in the building and under such circumstances. The detectives insisted, and, bidding good-bye to friends, he was conveyed to Mountjoy Prison.
 The annual meeting of the members of Saint Kevin's branch of the Gaelic League was held in 277 Richmond street, Dublin, on Nov. 3.
 The last group of the pilgrims from Ireland left Rome Oct. 29 for Genoa on their journey to Dublin under the direction of Father Ring, O. M. On the previous evening a number had gone on the same route. In the morning Alderman Delahunt was with a considerable group which left for Genoa. A large contingent of friends assembled to bid good-bye to the pilgrims and wish them a happy return.

CONNAGHT

GALWAY.—Miss Bodkin, daughter of Mr. Robert Bodkin, of Annagh, Ballyglunin, died recently, at an advanced age, in her residence, Eblana Terrace, Kingstown.
 The death of Mrs. Winifred Jordan occurred lately at her residence, Maltingard street, Galway, deeply regretted. The remains were conveyed to the Pro-Cathedral of St. Nicholas, where Solemn High Mass was celebrated on Oct. 31. After Mass the interment took place at Forthill cemetery.
 The secretary of the North Galway Coisde Ceannair of the Gaelic League visited the Milltown teaching district lately, and found the classes in a healthy condition. The reports from the branches are encouraging, showing that wherever started the evening classes have become Irish clubs for the young men of the parishes, Irish lessons learned, Irish stories told, Irish songs sung. A class for teachers is held every week in Tuam Town Hall.
 At the suggestion of the County Galway Antiquarian and Archaeological Society the Board of Works will preserve the old Abbey ruins in the county. Mr. John Broderick, builder and contractor, has been appointed to carry out the work of preservation, and has made a great improvement in the Abbey of Annaghdown and the old Church at Claregalway, the tower of the latter being almost perfect. The interior of this ancient edifice is in fair condition and many visitors call to view the artistic workmanship of the "men of long ago." The next ruin to be taken in hand is the celebrated Abbey of Ross, near Headford, said to be one of the most beautiful of its kind in Ireland.
LEITRIM.—Mr. Jaspar Tully has been denounced by all the United Irish League branches in South Leitrim and they have passed a resolution calling on him to resign his seat in the House of Commons as he no longer represents them.
 The death of Mr. H. Cummings, Manorbhamilton, occurred Oct. 10, at the home of his brother in Collooney. The funeral, largely attended, took place at Manorbhamilton. Special trains were run from Sligo and Enniskillen in order to bring railway employees to attend the funeral. Mr. Cummings was chief clerk at Manorbhamilton railway station for twenty-five years, and was also engaged as engineer to the Boyle, Mohill and Roscommon District Councils.
 Mr. John O'Neill, who has been in business in Dublin for many years died lately at the home of his parents in Clononhill. The funeral, Oct. 29, to the Drumlish, was very largely attended.
 Mr. James Johnson, of Kinlough House, was shooting on his property at Rossiver, near Garrison, lately, when he saw two men with guns and a dog. He followed them, and ran them to an old cow house, where he was ordered not to come any nearer. On turning round he saw a man aim a gun at him and fire, with the result that Mr. Johnston received shot in his hand and foot. The two men ran away, and Mr. Johnston followed them and with his two keepers chased them toward Gublanv Barrack, where the matter was reported, and the police making up the hunt, the two men were caught. Two guns and a false beard were got in a hedge.
