CONNAGHT

GALWAY.

The death of Mr. Patrick Forde, Dublin road, Tuam, occurred on January 24, at the early age of 14 years.

The Tuam Herald of February 7 contained the following: "A correspondent writes—it would be a wise and prudent thing for the Galway people, in view of their hopes of the establishment of a Transatlantic port there, to offer the seat to Hon. Edward Blake, M. P., for Longford and connected by family with Galway. Mr. Blake occupied the position now held by Sir William Laurier, and was once the most powerful politician in the Dominion and leader of the party now in office.

Feelings of regret were evinced throughout the diocese of Clonfert, when the death was announced of the Rev. Peter Lee, at Killoran, Banniasloe, on February 3. Father Lee was only 29 years of age, and was a native of Cloran, Headford. He was educated for the Archdiocese of Tuam, but after his ordination took up a curacy in Clonfert, and has remained in it since.

A solemn requiem high mass was celebrated in Killoran, after which the remains were removed to his native place—Cloran, Headford. Solemn requiem mass was also celebrated in Cloran, after which the interment took place.

The first "Ceilidh" of the members of the St. Grellan Branch of the Gaelic League, Ballinasloe, was held on February 1, when a very enjoyable evening was spent. After a brief address from Rev. T. J. Joyce, adm., president of the branch, in which he pointed out the advantages to be derived, intellectually and nationally, by membership of the Gaelic League, the evening's amusement commenced with a fine selection of Irish airs by the Gaelic orchestra.

On January 29 the golden jubilee of Mrs. Croly, known in religion as Sister Ignatius of the Sacred Heart, was celebrated at the Convent of Mercy, Loughrea. The Bishop of Clonfert, Most Rev. Dr. Healy, was present throughout the day and presided at the various functions, assisted by a large number of priests. Representatives of the several convents of Ballinasloe, Portlanna, Eyrecourt and Woodford attended the ceremonies. During the morning private masses of thanksgiving were celebrated in the Convent church by the bishop and priests.

LEITRIM.

On Sunday, Feb. 8, after 11 o'clock mass in Ballinagar Chapel, near Dromahair, Father Lynch administered the anti-treating pledge to a great number of persons. The number of pledged people now in the parish is very considerable.

MAYO.

The death of Mr. Patrick Fitzpatrick, of Derrygorman, a respected member of Westport District Council. On Tuesday morning his remains were removed to Westport Parish church and placed on a catafalque in front of the high altar. At 9 o'clock high mass of requiem was celebrated for the repose of his soul, and there was a large congregation present.

P., did equally good work at home with his friends, Mr. Mills and Mr. O'Malley, county councillors, Belmullet. The speech of Father Lyons lent new features of practical importance in every line to the need, the safety and the rapidity which may be secured by Blackrod as a leading Transatlantic port, for any or for every purpose—postal, naval or mercantile. The first great stride has been made by the chairman and his supporters on the deputation in a matter the vital importance of which can not be overestimated in these days, and which the near future will disclose. St. John's is only 1,510 miles from Blackrod less than three days' steam with present liners. It can not be too often repeated that there is no coasting, no river work, no broken water, and the highest land-fall and the least fog of any day in the Three Kingdoms.

ROSCOMMON.

The funeral of the late Mr. William Connolly, Carrowkeel, Boyle, took

place at Kilmannagh, Feb. 11. The cortege consisted of eighty cars.

Mr. Edward Egan, sr., of Boyle, died February 9. On Wednesday the funeral which was one of the largest and most representative seen for years past, took place.

SLIGO.

Rt. Rev. Dr. Healy, Bishop of Clonfert, who has been appointed Archbishop of Tuam, was born in Ballinacorney, on the shore of Lough Arrow, County Sligo, November 14, 1841, ordained priest in 1867, and about 1883 was appointed Coadjutor Bishop of Clonfert. He is a very learned ecclesiastic.

A public meeting was held after mass in Killeevan, the half parish of Ballymois, on February 8. Rev. Father Dan Gallagher presided and made a stirring speech. Mr. James Keane proposed a series of resolutions, one pledging faith in the tenants' representative at the Land Conference. Mr. P. Flynn seconded the resolutions, which were carried. Mr. John Gilmartin addressed the people at some length. He spoke of the evils of grabbing, and called on the people to keep united and victory would soon be achieved. The meeting dispersed, cheers being given for the Irish leaders.

Mr. Laurence Colliery, son of Mr. B. Colliery, died February 7 in Cregg House, Ballinacorney, at the early age of 24 years. He was studying for the medical profession in Dublin. The remains had been brought from Ballinacorney to the Cathedral.

MUNSTER

CLARE.

The funeral of Rev. Daniel Garry, Crusheen, took place in the Parish church on February 10 after solemn office and high mass, at which there was an immense congregation from Crusheen and surrounding parishes. The deceased clergyman was of an old and popular West Clare family. He was only in his 49th year, and had been close to twenty-five years in the ministry. Ruau was the scene of his first mission and subsequently Kilmihil, Miltova Malbay, Kilkishen and Kilrush, and four years ago he was appointed administrator of Crusheen.

Mr. William Redmond, M. P., on his first visit to his constituency since his release from Kilmarnock on February 10, was the recipient of a magnificent reception. At every station from Limerick he was awaited by deputations of the Nationalists and addresses were presented. At Ballycar Station the members of the Newmarket-on-Fergus of the Irish Land and Newmarket Branch of the Irish Land and four hundred marched from the village, headed by the Workingmen's brass band. As the train whistled at the distance signal, torches blazed, the band giving the stirring strains of Ireland's national anthem. The first to greet the member for East Clare was the Rev. J. O'Houlihan, who, in the Gaelic tongue, bade Mr. Redmond welcome to freedom and to Clare.

CORK.

Rev. M. Brew presided at a meeting of the members of the Young Men's Society, Kantuck, Feb. 8, when it was decided to have the Irish language taught in the Hall in the future.

A concert took place in Rafferty's Town Hall, Mallow, on Feb. 5, under the auspices of the Cork Pipers' club. This club, which has come through a storm of struggles, has now made itself a potent factor in the Gaelic revival and it must be said that its form of engaging in its very laudable work has the character of being the most attractive and the most influential, as it appeals to the sentiment of a sentimental race. The club works very energetically, and sometimes at a loss. Mr. Wayland and his fellow workers are worthy of praise for the manner in which they labored to carry out the programme.

To the deep regret of her friends and the good nuns of the Presentation Community of Millstreet, Miss Julia Dennehy, in religion Sister Francis, passed away recently after a religious life of over forty years. A solemn requiem mass was celebrated in the Parish church. Celebrant, Rev. J. Burke.

On February 9 the new Clonpriest Male and Female schools, built at Gortree, near Youghal, were opened by Monsignor Keller. At 12 o'clock the children marched two deep from the old schools to the new schools, while the monsignor entered and blessed the buildings. Then, after the boys had taken possession for a brief time of their own premises, all the children, the teachers and a large number of parishioners, assembled in the girls' school. There were present Father Ahern, Father Whelan and Father Nagle, as also Mr. J. Murray, son of Mr. M. Murray, Youghal, builder of the schools, and a number of the monitors and pupils of the Presentation Convent, Youghal. After the opening chorus, "Let Erin Remember," by the boys and girls, Mr. R. Purcell, principal teacher of the boys' school, addressing Monsignor Keller, bade him welcome to the new schools in the name of the teachers and pupils. He said that day marked a turning point in the educational history of Clonpriest Parish. After Monsignor Keller's address the following programme was performed: Solo in Irish, traditional style, Miss Katie Bransfield;

chorus, "Welcome Home," girls' class; Irish dance, reel and double, Master Griffin and Miss Sheehan; chorus in four parts, "Lullaby-Hush-a-Bye, Baby," girls' class; recitation in Irish, Master James Crowley; chorus in parts, "The Harp," boys' and girls' classes combined; solo in Irish, Miss Katie O'Brien; recitation in Irish, Miss F. Sheehan; chorus, "Home, Sweet Home," boys' class; chorus, "Let the Hills Resound," boys' and girls' class.

ANTRIM.

Mr. Craig, the landowners' and Orangemen's candidate, was elected member of Parliament for South Antrim on February 13. He defeated Dr. Keightley, the tenants' candidate, by 849 votes. On February 7 the Woodburn factory in Carrickfergus was destroyed by fire. The premises, which form a branch of the County Down Flax Spinning and Weaving Company, were within a mile of Carrickfergus and consisted of two large buildings in which linen weaving and bleaching of fine linen were carried on. The old wing of the factory is stated to have been built about one hundred years ago.

Three hundred persons are thereby thrown out of employment. The financial loss is estimated at over \$100,000.

On February 4 the burial took place of Mrs. Marie de La Croix at the convent, Lisburn. The deceased nun was the daughter of the late John Enright, of Dublin, and sister of Rev. Father Andrew, C. P., Glencoe, Adelaide, Australia. On Wednesday the funeral ceremonies took place in the convent chapel. Most Rev. H. Henry presided at the solemn high mass, which was celebrated by Rev. D. J.
