EASTER.

To-day ends the Lenten season and to-morrow the Church resumes her joyful garments, laid aside for a time. The Gloria peals joyously forth and everything wears a glad appearance. We have followed Christ in His Passion, watched with Him in the garden, stood with Him before Caiaphas and Pilate, heard with Him the rabble cry for His death, seen Him delivered over to a cruel and ignominious death, pitied Him carrying His cross; witnessed the most sublime sacrifice in the world's history, heard Christ comfort His repentant companion in misery, listened to His touching and affecting prayer for those who sought His death; then shared in the confusion when the Son of Man gave up the Ghost. His life of expiation for the sins of mankind is now ended. To-day His body reposes in the tomb, but death has no power over Him. To-morrow He comes forth to shed o'er the world for a time the light of His benign presence. His death and resurrection should be types of what has been taken place in our souls. We have been sorrowing and doing penance for our sins; to-morrow we should have made peace with our Creator and should, with Him, rise to a life of devotion to our God and His Church. May the light of the risen Christ illuminate our Hearts and fill every nook and crevice so completely that there will be no room for the Evil One to find a foot hold.

Five Minute Sermon.

The Resurrection of Our Lord. We ought to learn from these pious women spoken of in the Gospel to be courageous in working for the glory of Jesus Christ, and, as St. Gregory says, "we shall bring Him precious balm if we serve Him with humility and with mortification."

In regard to the early hour they left their homes, we should admire their true devotion, which admitted of no delay in executing their good purpose. He who sincerely serves God will never lose time, he abhors every delay that hinders him in doing all he can for God. In regard to the day, which was the first day of the week, we are to recognize that day of the Lord which afterward was to be the holy day of the Christian Church, on which we also should devote ourselves to works of religion, and bring balm to Jesus Christ. Finally, in the fact that the sun had risen, we see that a soul that sincerely seeks the glory of God will never remain in darkness, ignorance, or doubt, but will always find the light that comforts and guides it in all its steps. If, according to the laws of nature, the sun had risen, it had also risen according to the laws of grace, because Christ had already risen from the dead, and by His resurrection bestowed the full light of the Gospel, confirmed the true faith, and brought the day of life to the whole world.

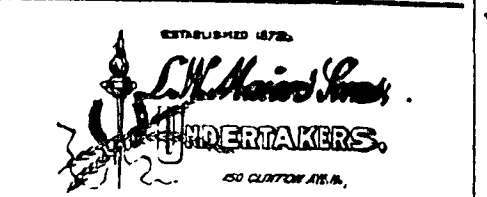

Waists of black or white china silk, unlined, front and back of handsome drawn work design beautified with tucks and hem-stitching, full sleeves, \$7.50 to \$10.

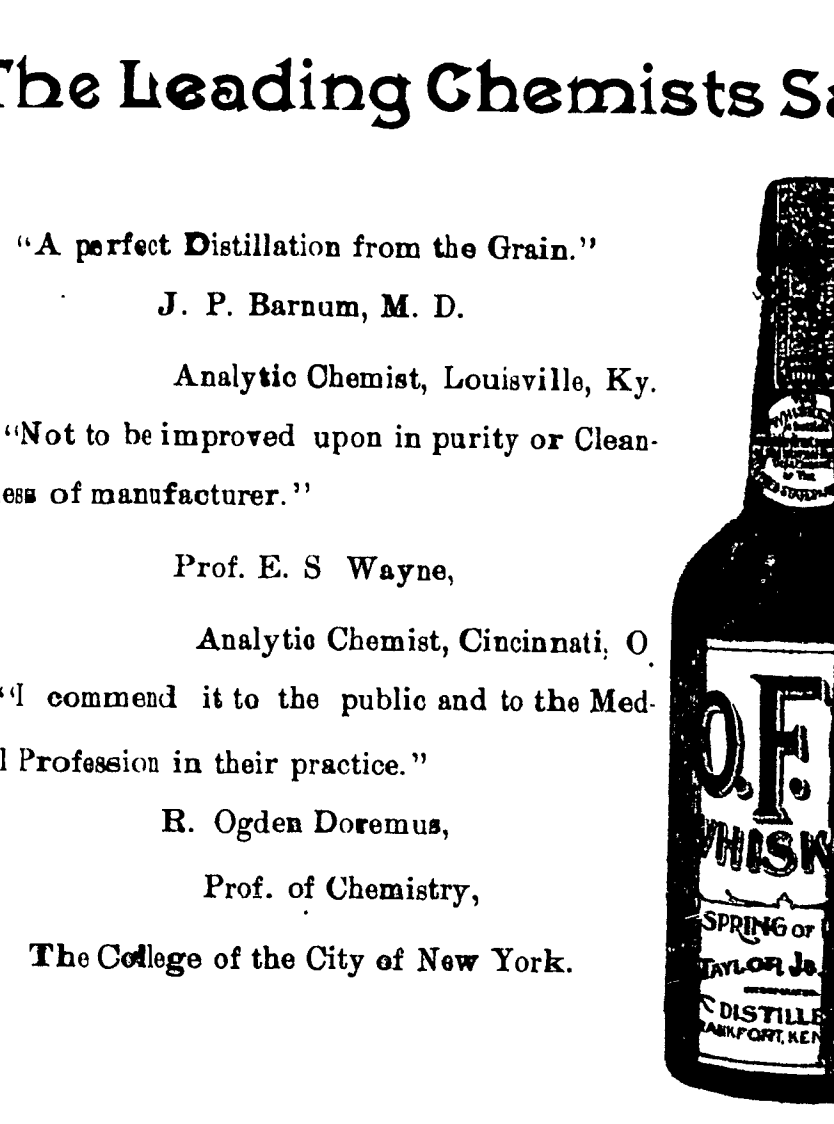
A Go-Cart for Baby.
Baby's coming out on Easter is all a matter of the go-cart. No matter how pretty the bonnet or dainty the cloak, all is for naught unless my lord or lady has the carriage. We are just ready to suit father, mother and the baby on the go-cart question. Never had such pretty equipages for so little as this season. Folding go-carts which you can almost pack up and put in your pocket—may be carried on the car or street car—from \$3 up. Adjustable go-carts with maroon or green running gears, rubber tire wheels and reed bodies, from \$4.50 to \$13.50. Many of the better go-carts have steel handles with porcelain cross bar. Go-carts which adjust to a carriage, \$16. Lace covers and equipment from \$1.40 to \$5.25.
