The funeral took place at nine o'clock on Tuesday from the Cathedral, of which Mrs. Nier was a member for fifty-four years.

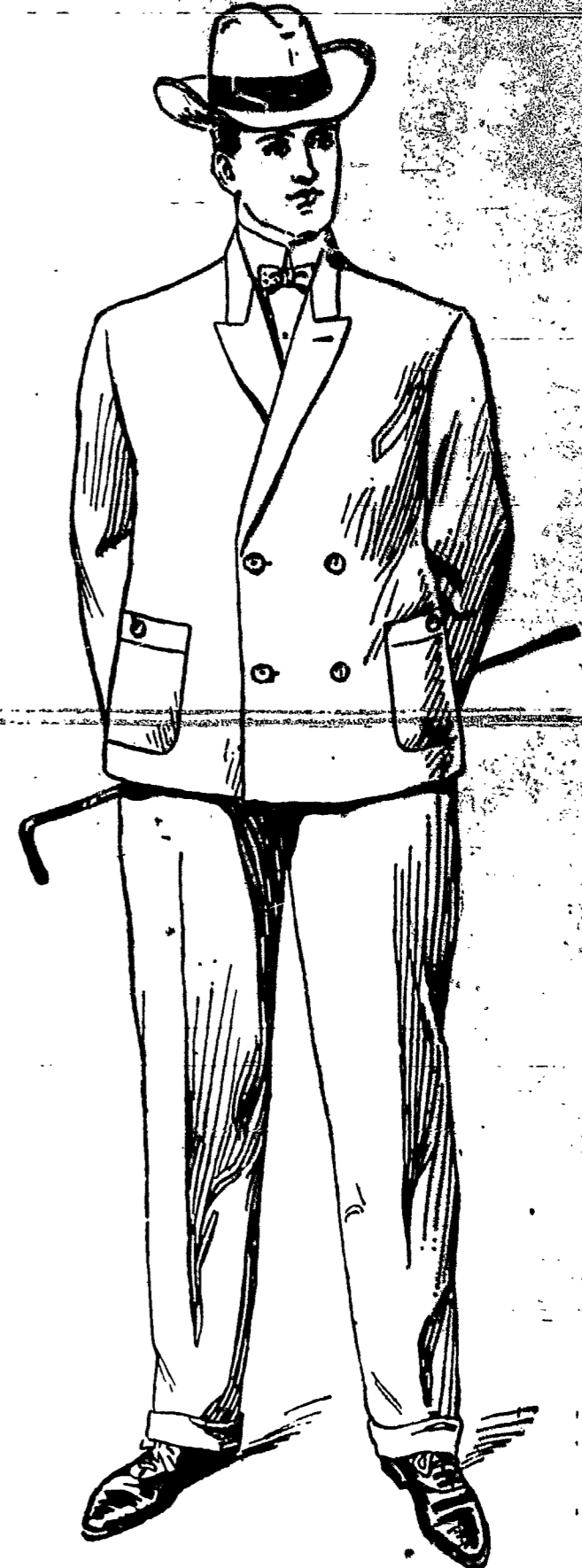
