NEW DOMINICAN SEMINARY.

The Somerset (O.) Institution to be Transferred to Washington. A new building for the education of students is to be erected by the Dominican order on the south side of Buncker Hill park, opposite the grounds of the Catholic University of Washington. The Dominicans have until now educated their students at Somerset, O., but the seminary there is inadequate to the needs of the present day. The chief work of the Dominicans after the cultivation of the theological sciences is the preaching of missions, and they have had a small number of priests to meet the demands. A new and urgent reason for a more spacious educational institution has arisen from conditions in the Philippines. Two Dominican Fathers now in the United States have been ordered to Manila and three more are in Rome preparing for the work in the East. It is certain that a considerable number of American Dominicans will be called to duty in the islands and they are to be trained for that work in the Washington seminary.

The plan of the building has been prepared by A. O. Von Heimlich of Washington. The new structure will be 182 feet in width of front and 210 feet in depth. It will contain 200 feet of front porch and 200 feet of side porch. The building is to be completed in the summer of 1904. The present location of the seminary is in the old building of the University of Washington. Plans.
