MONSIGNORE CONATY

TO BE APPOINTED TO THE VACANT SEE OF LOS ANGELES. The Noted Educator and Former Rector of the Catholic University of America at Washington is to Succeed Bishop Montgomery. A recent dispatch from Rome states that as a result of the favorable report of his eminence Cardinal Satolli, prefect of the congregation of studies, the congregation of the propaganda has decided to propose to the pope that he appoint Mgr. Conaty, former rector of the Catholic university at Washington, as bishop of Los Angeles, Cal., in succession to the Right Rev. George Montgomery, recently appointed coadjutor archbishop of San Francisco. The decision of the propaganda to propose the name of Bishop Conaty finally disposes of the matter, and it is only a question of time until official announcement of the appointment will be issued.

Bishop Conaty will not leave for his new field of labor until he receives the papal bull, which may not arrive for several months, according to precedent in such cases. He will remain at his present post until the arrival of his successor and will attend Mgr. O'Connell's installation in his new office. Bishop Conaty will be present also at the meeting of the trustees of the university in Washington on April 22 and will keep some engagements to visit friends in New England before starting for the west. Right Rev. Bishop Conaty was born in Ireland and when three years of age came to America with his parents who settled in Taunton, Mass., where his father had previously spent eight years of his boyhood. After graduating from the Taunton schools Bishop Conaty entered Montreal college in 1883 and spent four years there, finishing the humanities. In 1887 he entered Holy Cross college, Worcester, where he graduated in 1890. Returning to Montreal for his seminary course, he was ordained a priest for the diocese of Springfield Dec. 21, 1892, and entered immediately upon parochial work in Worcester, where he remained until he was appointed by his holiness Leo XIII. in November, 1896, to succeed Archbishop Keane as rector of the Catholic university at Washington.

Of the twenty-four years spent in Worcester seventeen were passed as pastor of the Sacred Heart parish, which he organized, building and completing the church and other parochial appointments. He was always active in social and educational work and from the first years of his priesthood identified himself with the Catholic total abstinence movement, in which he is still a prominent factor. He has been a lifelong total abstainer. He was honored many times by the votes of the citizens of Worcester, who elected him to positions of trust. For fourteen years he was a member of the board of education. When leaving Worcester for his new field of labor in this city, the citizens, regardless of creed and representing all the different phases of the life of the city, honored him with a public banquet, at which the good will of all classes was manifested.

In 1889 at the centennial celebration of Georgetown university, the degree of doctor of divinity was bestowed upon him as one of the representative graduates of Holy Cross college. In 1898 he was honored by the holy father with the appointment of domestic prelate, and the insignia of this dignity was conferred upon him by Cardinal Gibbons in the presence of a large gathering representing the American hierarchy. Nov. 21, 1901, Bishop Conaty was consecrated titular bishop of Samos by Cardinal Gibbons in the cathedral of Baltimore in the presence of a distinguished gathering of the American hierarchy, clergy and laity.—Washington Post.

An Episcopal Clergyman's Claim. Rev. C. B. Wright, canon of All Saints' Episcopal cathedral, Milwaukee, Wis., places Episcopal or Catholic, as he styles them—clergymen on an equality with the Christ. Mr. Wright in a recent sermon made some statements which have stirred up no little talk in religious circles. He said the priests of the Episcopal church in their power to forgive sins were equal to Christ. Should the Son of God return to earth and stand beside the priest at the altar the priest's power of forgiveness would be equal to that of the Saviour. Mr. Wright followed up this statement by another to the effect that the word of the priest was the word of God. His interpretation of the Scriptures was that the Almighty as God spoke through him. Clergymen outside the Episcopal, or Catholic, church gave only their interpretation of the Bible, which accounted for so many differences among the sects. As they had been given no heavenly powers by consecration by the bishop their teachings were simply their own, as God would not speak through them. Mr. Wright is a young priest who formerly was secretary of Bishop Nicholson. For several years he has been a canon of the cathedral and engaged in parish work.—Chicago Record-Herald.

God's Chastening. There is a virtue in the chastening of God and in the discipline of Christian living. It makes us appreciate that "the life is more than meat and the body than raiment," as Christ said. So God chastens us because he is mindful of our soul's eternal welfare. Do any of us regret the training of our childhood years, which has equipped us to fight better in the warfare of life? 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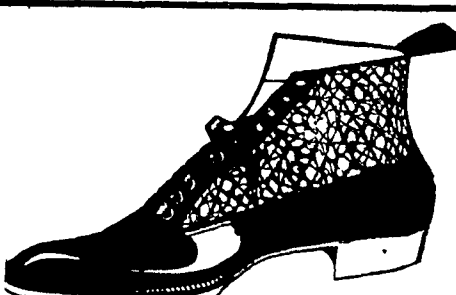
