## Key to last week's puzzle:

No. 1—Anchor is in water under forward part of ship in the foreground. Hidden man is in upper right hand corner when picture is held inverted.

No. 2—Blade of adz is at belt of Columbus; hammer is in water between the two ships, beside the rope in center. Invert picture. Handle of saw is formed by Columbus' hair and plume.

No. 3—Turn left side of picture down. First workman is at elbow of man in foreground with log on his shoulder. Invert picture. Second man's face is outlined by that of man with plumed hat.

No. 4—Boot is formed by right sleeve of man at tiller. Turn left side of picture down. Sailor is in point of land near bow of distant ship.
