Key to last week's puzzles:

No. 1—Invert picture. First bird's beak is at hand of second man from right of picture; second bird's bill is at right eye of same man.

No. 2—Fish is at foot of sail in center of picture. Invert picture. Head of man is at foot of rope that holds the other sail.

No. 3—First trumpet is in sleeve of man at right of picture; second is at right ear of man at far side of Columbus; the bell is in same man's breast.

No. 4—Compass is in hat of man in center. Turn right side of picture down. Head of sailor is at plume of man at right side of picture.

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
