



How to Dress for a Photograph. There is more in gatting a photograph han simply going to a photographer. "The rest of the story is soon told.

He must know his business and you must know yours, otherwise the result will be a likeness that is neither flattering nor truthful.

If you are short and stout don't ask the poor artist to make a picture of your full length. He will if you insist, but he knows he is doing a great wrong thereby. Nothing is so graceful and pleasing in a picture of a stout lady is a sitting at half-length, the figure


