Key to last week's puzzle:

No. 1—Invert picture. Hidden gunner is in stairs in center of picture, his hair formed by that of man standing at bottom. Cannon is at beard of man in lower right-hand corner of picture.

No. 2—Invert picture. Cavalier's head is back of kneeling Columbus. Their hair is identical. Bell is in breast of man standing with clasped hands at bow of boat.

No. 3—Invert picture. Hat of hidden sailor is formed by that of Columbus, who is standing between the two Indians on upper deck. Turn right side of picture down. Bell is in breast of sailor grasping rope on lower deck.

No. 4—Turn left side of picture down. Mouth of vase touches tree just above upraised left hand of man on the other side of the tree. Stone is just over head of man in extreme right of picture.
