### BATH.

Mass next Sunday will be at 9:15 o'clock sharp. The collection for the Holy Father will be taken up next Sunday.

The feast of Corpus Christi was observed at St. Mary's church, Thursday, by the celebration of mass at 8:15 o'clock by the Rev. Father Griffin.

The first annual Hibernian field day of Steuben County will be held at Glenwood, a suburb of Hornellsville, on Thursday, July 9. It is the intention of the A. O. H. divisions of this county in Corning, Bath and Hornellsville to make these field days annual events, and whether they will be held in the future depends, in a large measure, on the success of this, their first attempt. However, from the present outlook, it is safe to say that several thousand people will be present on this occasion. The final arrangements were made for the field day at a meeting of the joint committee from the three divisions held in the private office of James J. Manning, district superintendent of the Metropolitan Insurance Company, at Corning on Thursday evening last. The following representatives of the three divisions of the county were present: Hornellsville, C. P. Lyons, E. F. Dealy; Bath, James L. Grogan, C. E. Tyrrell; Corning, James J. Manning, William J. O'Neil, J. S. Garty. William J. O'Neil was chosen chairman, J. E. Grogan, secretary and E. F. Dealy, of treasurer. Committees were appointed as follows: Press committee, James L. Grogan, and E. F. Dealy of Hornellsville; Messrs. Grogan, Garty and Lyons were also empowered to select an honorary committee. The music committee consists of Messrs. Dealy, Lyons and Sullivan of Hornellsville. A feature of the day will be a base ball game between Corning and Hornellsville. A feature of the day will be a base ball game between Corning and Hornellsville. Other events are: Running races 100 and 200 yards, hop, skip and jump contest, three legged race, broad jump, throwing the stone, tug of war, Hornellsville vs. Corning, ladies tug of war, Bath vs. Hornellsville; fat men's race, entries already received, Dick Flynn, of Bath, Billy Sullivan of Hornellsville, Jim Austin of Corning. The latest Coney Island novelty, the Helter Skelter will be erected on the grounds for the day only. A dance will be run both afternoon and evening, and good music will be furnished. Tickets for the Field Day will soon be placed in the hands of members of the three divisions at Bath, Corning and Hornellsville, and these will be exchangeable for railroad tickets. Excursion rates will be given from all towns, and will be announced in a few days. It was expected that the field day would be held at Bath, but as the Hornellsville division was anxious to entertain the members of the order and their friends on the occasion of the initial field day it was finally decided to go to Glenwood, which is an ideal place for such a gathering. All the Catholic societies in Steuben County, their families and friends are invited to accompany the A. O. H. on this occasion. It is expected that several thousand people will be there. The members of the local division are enthusiastic over the scheme and every member is working hard to make it a success. At a special meeting plans for the trip etc. were discussed. It is likely that a special train will be run from Bath.
