The death of Mrs. Mary Bell, which occurred at the family residence, No. 114 Field St., on Sunday, July 19, removed from St. Mary's parish one of its oldest and most respected members. Mrs. Bell had reached the ripe old age of 81, but retained her vitality to a marked degree, up to the time of her death. Of late years she had been more feeble and despite all the care loving hands could bestow, she grew weaker day by day and on Sunday peacefully passed away, surrounded by her family, whose loving prayers accompanied her soul on its journey to the throne of God. Deceased was born in Dublin, Ireland and came to this country with her husband, the late Patrick Bell, in 1851. Later they removed to Rochester, which has been her home ever since. A devoted member of St. Mary's for fifty years Mrs. Bell, like her husband, gave largely to every organized charity in the parish. She was one of those beautiful lives devoted to doing good quietly and helpfully and where good deeds were most needed. At the time St. Mary's parish was divided and that of the Blessed Sacrament formed, Mrs. Bell contributed freely of her time and means to the work of this parish as to the former, thus leaving to her children the precious heritage of her holy example. Having a little yet giving much, scattering seeds which shall bring a golden harvest for other reapers to garner. Deceased was blessed with four children, three of whom survive her, James and Patrick Bell, and Mrs. John Clooney, all of this city. St. M. Alphonsus of Nazareth convent, deceased, was a daughter Mrs. Bell. There are eleven grandchildren. The funeral was held on Wednesday morning from the church of the Blessed Sacrament at 9 o'clock. The mass was celebrated by Rev. Thomas Connors assisted by Rev. Fathers Bell of Grafton, Ill., and Rev. Martin Cluney of Honeye Falls, as deacon and sub-deacon. Rev. Father Connors pronounced the final blessing and the remains were consigned to their resting place. The pall bearers were: Messrs. Geyer, L. Weiss, E. Hubert, J. Stephenson, Hanneffy and Murry.

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


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
