Connaught

GALWAY—The consecration of Rev. Dr. O'Dea as Bishop of Clontarf, will take place in the Cathedral, Longrua, August 30.

On the eve of St. John's Day Tuam honored the occasion, as it always did, by having bonfires on Tullinadaly Hill and at the Bridge, Bishop street. All the townspeople turned out, and dancing was kept up till a late hour.

The Matt Harris Memorial Executive Committee in Ballinasloe is composed of L. Conroy, chairman; D. P. Kelly, vice chairman; Rev. T. J. Joyce, adm.; L. Conroy and T. Byrne, treasurers; John Sogavin and M. Staunton, secretaries, with J. Ward and J. Kilmartin.

Most Rev. Dr. Healy, Archbishop of Tuam lately made the following changes: Rev. Michael Heany, C. C.; parish priest of Caberlistrane; Rev. Father Prendergast, St. Jarlath's College, C. C., Crossboyne; Rev. J. O'Reilly, Clare Island, C. C., Partry; Rev. W. Byrne, C. C., Clare Island; Rev. Father Ronayne, Kiltullagh, C. C., Glennamaddy, and Rev. Father Donnellan, Glennamaddy, C. C., Kiltullagh.

Most Rev. Dr. Healy, Archbishop of Tuam, will visit the parishes of Moylough and Mountbellew. He will bless the two marble side altars with their marble statues, erected in the Mountbellew church, at a cost of fifteen hundred dollars. The altar of the Sacred Heart is a memorial to the late Dr. O'Reilly, of Mountbellew, and is the gift of Mrs. O'Reilly, his wife. The altar of Our Blessed Lady is the gift of the parish priest.

An Irish concert and entertainment was given at Menio on July 5. It was something after the style of the concert recently given in Byre Square. The program included Gaelic songs, recitations, etc. There were also competitions; prizes were awarded.

On July 14, Most Rev. Dr. Healy was at the Palace, Tuam, the recipient of addresses from representative bodies in Ballinasloe, where he resided for eighteen years as Bishop of Clontarf. The first address was from the priests and people of Ballinasloe, with this address there was a beautiful crozier, made by Smyth, of Wicklow street, Dublin. This crozier stands six feet high, is an exact copy of the Clonmacnoise crozier, and studded with precious stones. The design, which is Celtic, is very beautiful. The address, which was illuminated and artistically framed, has on the top a photograph of the Archbishop, and on the sides are Tuam Cathedral and Clonmacnoise Board of Guardians and Rural District Council. This address was from the Ballinasloe Temperance Society, which at same time, presented a Missal, bound in Morocco. The frontispiece illuminated in a most artistic manner.

CORK—At the Kanturk Hospital Andrew Connors, of Glencarney, died July 17 under peculiar circumstances. He and a fellow worker named Benjamin Lane had an altercation. The latter struck Connors on the side of the jaw. The blow was not a severe one and the combatants made friends a few moments after. That night Connors complained that the root of an old tooth had been loosened and that his jaw was giving him pain. Next day the side of his face was much swollen and he went to hospital. The swelling increased, followed by erysipelas and blood poisoning supervened. He was assiduously attended to by Dr. Barry, assisted by Dr. O'Leary, but despite their efforts he succumbed. When Connors' life became imperilled Lane was placed under arrest and was brought up at Newmarket petty sessions before the Hon. H. G. Lysaght, on a charge of homicide. Mr. D. E. Ferguson, solicitor, Kanturk, appeared for the prisoner. Formal evidence having been given the accused was remanded for eight days.

Referring to the land bill, he said they had by the strength of their organized representation made the restoration of the evicted tenants secure. That might be said to affect 10,000 tenants in Ireland, but as Mr. Redmond pointed out to the government, these 10,000 constitute the sore of the body politic. They were men with grievances; they gave up their holdings and sacrificed their interests, and it was through them the benefits that other tenants got were secured. The National convention held that to abandon even one would be treachery, and he was delighted to tell them that amendments had been inserted in the bill providing that every evicted tenant would be restored to his original holding, or provided with an equivalent farm in the nearest estate. In the case of evicted tenants whose land had been grabbed, power was in the measure to compensate the grabber, if willing to clear out; and not alone that, but provision was made by which funds would be available to give the reinstated tenant a fresh start in life.

LOUTH—The funeral of the late Mr. Joseph Weidon took place July 13, from his late residence to the local cemetery. Great numbers attended. He was aged 76 years.

The Prior of St. Augustine's, Drogheda, Father Purcell, has been enabled through the generosity of an unknown donor to provide new seating in the Epistle Aisle of the church. The new benches are of stained pine, made in excellent style by a local contractor, Mr. Bernard McDonnell, Bull Ring. They will prove a great comfort to the congregation. The reverend prior has been re-elected prior of St. Augustine's at a recent chapter of his order.

MEATH—The whole Meath County Council have agreed to resign if the local government continues to meddle with its affairs.

A most enjoyable day's outing was had by those who were of the party.

WEXFORD—Mr. Matthew Dunne, son of Mr. Dunne, National school teacher, Blackwater, was accidentally drowned in Liverpool July 10. Deceased had been employed on the Atlantic liner Celtic, and was missed on Friday morning. The body has not been recovered.

Miss Elizabeth Kelly, daughter of Mrs. Kelly, the Quay, Ennisclorthy died in Mercer's Hospital, Dublin, lately after a short illness. She was telegraphist in the general postoffice, Dublin. Only a short time before her death she had been at her home on a four weeks' vacation; she was then in excellent health. Her remains were interred in Garrynsick, July 13.

Ulster

ANTRIM—On July 12 the remains of Mrs. McGoldrick, Belfast, were laid to rest in Milltown cemetery. The Rev. R. Crickard, Father McCartan, F. Lavery, P. Curran, D. O'Hagan, W. Kirwan, G. Peden, W. McKibbin, J. McKibride, P. Murphy, J. J. McElhomb, Mr. McKay, Mr. Arnold, Mr. Edwards, Mr. Mulrooney and several other prominent civilians attended the funeral.

The Irish Weekly, July 18, writing about the Orange ruffians, said: "By those experienced in Orange processions in Belfast it is unanimously admitted that the ruffianism of the brethren on Monday, July 13, surpassed anything witnessed in years. The return journey from Cloughfern afforded numerous instances of the evil spirit that moved the brethren. They tried their best to raise a row passing Carrick Hill and North Queen street, but failing they diverted their attention to Union and Liberty street. At both points each band made a prolonged halt, during which the air of 'Kick the Pope' was played and vocalized by the rag-tag and bob-tail following." "I think of these assassins being permitted to do as they wish! The Catholics and Nationalists must have poor, miserable, cringing creatures as leaders to tolerate it. There is but one way to forever stop this annual display of Orange ruffianism, and that is for the other side to arm and shoot down the Orange dogs in Warrenpoint these Orange heroes ran away when one Nationalist drew his revolver and fired at them."

DONEGAL—Mr. Francis O'Callaghan of Cruckgranua, Carudonagh, died July 14, aged 78 years, deeply regretted. The aged father of Rev. John O'Callaghan of Malin Head.

He gave a handsome subscription as a testimony of his admiration, and said he was so much pleased with the beauty of the church that he would recommend it for assistance to some of his rich friends in New Orleans.

The death of Miss Alice O'Kane, daughter of the late Mr. Thomas O'Kane, Omagh, and cousin of Rev. James O'Kane, occurred at the Parochial House, Campsie, Omagh, on July 13. The deceased was about 86 years of age. The remains were borne to Killybegher church, where requiem mass was celebrated.
