What is Being Done by the People at Home—Various Items From Every Section of the Emerald Isle.

Connaught

GALWAY—Rev. Father McAlinney, son of the proprietor of the Eglinton Hotel, Salthill, Galway, was recently ordained priest in Paris, by the Archbishop of Cashel. Father McAlinney received his preliminary education in St. Joseph's Seminary, Nans Island in which he spent six years. Father McAlinney belongs to the dioceses of Galway.

Mrs. Fahy, of Taylor's Hill, Galway City, died July 20, at the great age of 95 years, deeply regretted. She brought up a large and well educated family of sons and daughters, nearly all of whom emigrated to the United States, where most of her children and grandchildren reside. One of her daughters is Rev. Mother Columba, superior of the nuns in charge of a large convent and schools of Staten Island, New York. The remains were conveyed to the church of St. Joseph, where high mass was celebrated, after which the interment took place at Fonthill cemetery.

Most Rev. Dr. Healy, Archbishop of Tuam, arrived in the Aran Isles on Sunday, July 26, for the purpose of blessing and laying the foundation stones of the new church of St. Brigid at Kiltironan. On approaching the South Island he was met by the islanders in curraachs and yawls. A similar greeting awaited him at the Middle Island. On disembarking at Kiltironan Pier he was received by the Rev. Murtagh Farragh, P. P., the Rev. Michael Hughes, C. C., and a large concourse of persons and was warmly greeted. A special excursion was given by the steamer Duras from Galway and a large number including several clergymen, traveled by it. Among the priests from Galway were Very Rev. Charles McAuley, adm., St. Paul's, Belfast; Rev. Richard Orave, St. Peter's, Belfast. After the solemn ceremonies school children were introduced and under the direction of Mrs. Waters, sang in Irish "Slante na nGaele." One, MacDara MacDonough, sang in Irish in fine style "The Wearing of the Green." The Archbishop expressed his appreciation, and said he would support a project for the establishment of an Irish school in the Middle Island for the people of Aran and visitors, provided the teachers know Irish from childhood and possessed general culture.

MAYO—Father F. Wallace, of Albany diocese, New York, is on a visit to Ireland. Father Wallace is a native of Carrick, Ballinlough. He was ordained in the United States nineteen years ago.

Miss M. A. Lynskey, aged 8 years, of Castlebar, was awarded a special prize of a silver medal at the recent Gaelic League Fols, held in Ballina, for her very excellent performance of pieces on the violin.

The wedding of Mr. James Joseph Hession of Roundfirth, Hollymount, and Miss Mary Della Killeen of Claremorris took place in the parish church of Claremorris July 27. Mr. Thomas O'Mullane, the Downes, Ballingarry, died July 25, at the early age of 41 years, deeply and widely regretted.

Mrs. Margaret Daly, mother of Alderman Dially of Limerick, ex-political prisoner and ex-mayor of Limerick City, died July 28, at the extraordinary age of 95 years, deeply regretted. The funeral took place from her home in William street, and showed the deep respect in which the deceased was held. It also manifested the esteem entertained for her son, Alderman John Daly. The interment was from St. Michael's church to Mount St. Lawrence cemetery.

KING'S—Rev. P. Briody, pastor of Tubberclare, died July 23, in Dublin, deeply regretted. His funeral took place at Glasnevin cemetery, and those at the graveside were: The Very Rev. John Curry, St. Mary's, Drogheda; Rev. B. Brady, Dunboyne; Rev. Charles Crinion, Clara; Rev. Thomas Gaughan, Tubberclare; Rev. Francis Glennon, Tang; Rev. William O'Reilly, Liverpool, etc. Born about sixty-two years ago in the parish of Fore, Westmeath, he studied in the seminary at Navan and the National college of Maynooth. After his ordination about 1867, he filled curacies in the diocese of Meath. Possessed of a tender heart and noble spirit, he grieved over the sufferings of his people, who were oppressed by iniquitous land laws that are now passing into oblivion. What ever he could do for the tenantry by counsel, by organization, and by steadfast action was always done to shield them from oppression and keep them in the land of their birth. In the parish of Moanangent, a parish rendered famous by the evictions that took place there in the beginning of the career of the late Bishop of Meath, the Most Rev. Dr. Nulty, and which he graphically and pathetically described. Father Briody took the part of the tenants in many hard fought struggles against exacting agents and heartless land owners, and many of the tenants owe their retention of their holdings to his pluck. Transferred from thence to Athboy, where he labored for ten years, he was, on the death of Father Peter Kelly, appointed to the pastorate of Slane and Monknewtown. Subsequently he was transferred to the parish of Tubberclare.

LOUTH—The funeral of the late Mr. John Kelly, chief officer of Drogheda Steam Packet Company, took place July 30 to Chord. Great numbers attended.

Mr. Patrick Waldon, an officer of the Drogheda Corporation for more than

twenty-five years, died deeply regretted. The funeral from St. Peter's to Chord cemetery was attended by a great number of citizens.

MEATH—The members of the Kilmessaw Total Abstinence League held their annual excursion July 26, the place selected being the ancient and historic city of the Tribes, Galway. Three hundred members enjoyed the day. The excursion started at 7.15, taking in some passengers at Drumree and Dunboyne. ANTRIM—A meeting of the Joseph Devlin Branch of the United Irish League was held on Sunday, July 26. Mr. Anderson occupied the chair. The chairman addressed the meeting on the death of His Holiness Leo XIII. The following resolution was proposed by Mr. Patrick Carroll, seconded by Mr. Thomas Martin, and passed in silence: "That we express our sorrow at the death of our Holy Father, by which the Christian world has suffered a great loss, and Ireland especially." The meeting adjourned without transacting business.

The remains of the late Mrs. Samuel Hill were removed on July 23 from her residence at Station Road, Larne, to the burying ground, Randalstown, where it was met by a large number of the parishioners of the deceased lady's native place. ARMAGH—When Cardinal Logue was about leaving Rome, after participating in the election of Pius X., he was to have had a private audience with the Pope, but his holiness, while celebrating mass July 11, became sick and all audiences were given up.

CAVAN—The death of the Very Rev. John O'Reilly, Virginia, occurred at his residence on July 22. The deceased had attained the age of 81 years, and his death, after 57 years of zealous work, occasioned a feeling of sincere sorrow, not only among his parishioners, but the entire Catholic population of the diocese of Kilmore.

DERRY—On July 27, in St. Eugene's cathedral, Derry, a solemn pontifical requiem mass was celebrated by Most Rev. Dr. O'Doherty for the repose of the soul of Leo XIII. The Rev. Father Gildea had been in delicate health for a considerable time, but it was not until a few weeks ago that the ear trouble from which he suffered became acute, and finally this disease extended rapidly, and in spite of all that medical care could do it proved fatal July 28.

DOWN—Thomas Murphy, 14 years of age, residing in Mountpleasant, and Robert and Michael Burland, Pong street, went to bathe in a disused quarry hole in the townland of Ballynacraig. They had not been long in the water when one of the Burlands, 7 years of age, got in deep water and sank. On coming to the surface Murphy caught him by the hand and pulled him to the bank and left him there. By this time the other brother, Michael Burland, was in difficulties and could not get near the bank. The deceased had jumped in and pushed him toward the bank, and he got safely landed. Poor Murphy himself, however, was so exhausted that he was unable to climb up the bank, and sank before the eyes of the two boys whom he saved. The Burlands made their way home and told their mother what had happened.

A tragedy took place on the Dublin road, between Newry and Flurrybridge, on July 25. It seems Mrs. McGinnetty and her daughter-in-law, Mrs. Rice, came into Newry, and, after making some purchases, started for home. Mrs. McGinnetty was driving and all went well until they got near Aghavalogue bridge, when the mare started to go at a rapid pace, finally developing into a gallop. Soon afterward Mrs. Rice jumped out. She fell in front of the cart and the wheel passed over her leg, breaking it. The vehicle then disappeared from Mrs. Rice's view, with Mrs. McGinnetty in the cart. The mare and cart next made their appearance at Mrs. Rice's house, empty. The inmates of the house became alarmed and Michael Rice, the deceased cousin, and Eliza Rice, Mrs. Rice's daughter, started to search. First they found Mrs. McGinnetty lying dead on the road, with a terrible fracture on her skull. From the nature of the injuries death must have been instantaneous. Further on they came on Mrs. Rice, with her leg broken. The jury, after hearing the evidence, found that Mrs. McGinnetty came to her death on Saturday by fracture of the skull, sustained by having either fallen or jumped out of the cart. Mrs. McGinnetty was 74 years of age.

FERMANAGH—The news of the death of Pope Leo XII. caused profound regret in Enniskillen. At the weekly meeting of the archconfraternity of the holy family in St. Michael's church on July 20, the Rev. Father Donnelly said he had a sad announcement to make to them. The sovereign pontiff passed away that afternoon. His life had been closed by a holy and edifying death, and he asked the congregation to offer up the rosary for the repose of his soul. On July 23, in conformity with the directions of the Most Rev. Dr. Owens, bishop of Clogher, a solemn requiem mass was offered up in St. Michael's church, Enniskillen, for the late pontiff. Right Rev. Mgr. Smollen presided; Rev. P. H. Maguire, Enniskillen, was celebrant; Rev. James McManus, Enniskillen, deacon; Rev. Francis J. Donnelly, Enniskillen, sub-deacon, and Rev. George McMeel, Whitehill, Ballinamallard, master of ceremonies. The chanters were: Rev. Philip McGinlity, Kilskeery, and Rev. Thomas Brennan, Irvinestown. The other clergy in the choir were: Rev. Thos. Gallagher, Tempo; Rev. Eugene Mc Mahon, Arney; Very Rev. Canon McQuade, Monea; Rev. P. Hackett Derrygonnelly; Rev. D. McGrath, Derrygonnelly; Rev. E. Quigley, Lisnaskea, and Rev. P. Fitzpatrick, Maguires bridge.

MONAGHAN—Requiem mass was celebrated in St. Macartin's cathedral Monaghan, July 30, in accordance with the direction of Most Rev. Dr. Owens, lord bishop of Clogher, for the repose of the soul of Pope Leo XIII. There was a large and devout congregation present. The celebrant of the mass was Rev. James Gallagher.

Saint Joseph's church, Carrickmacross, was broken into July 29, and the money taken out of the boxes where contributions for various charitable purposes were held. The key of the vestry door of the Protestant church was found in the Catholic church.

TYRONE—The death of Mr. John Herdman took place at Carricklee Strabane, July 26. Mr. Herdman was a generous man. He took an active part in the management of the spinning industry carried on by the Herdman family at Elen Mills. The deceased was a member of the Tyrone county council, and chairman of the Strabane board of guardians. He was instrumental in establishing a steam boat service in Donegal. The people of Buncrana regret his death.
