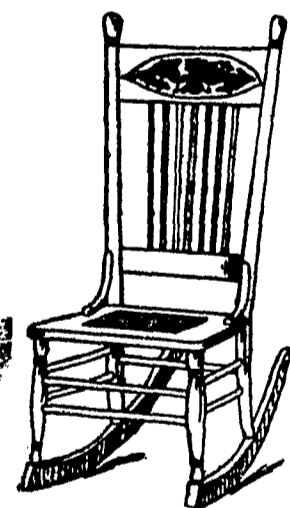

Second child's head is between runner's legs, its features outlined by right leg, the nose at the back of knee. Turn left side of picture down. Third child is in body of runner, the top of its head touching his closed hand.

No. 2—Cup is in knee of trousers of boy who stands nearest organ grinder. Turn left side of picture down. Owl is in foliage above fence in a direct line over heads of boys. Invert picture. Man is in upper left hand corner when picture is thus held, his features outlined by boy's leg, the nose at bottom of his jacket.

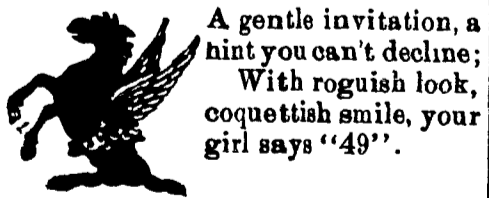
No. 3—Invert picture. Head of hidden man is in lower right corner of picture when thus held, outlined by foliage. Elbow of youth standing on bridge touches back of hidden man's head. Head of boy is between youth and girl, his features outlined by hair, hat and shoulder of girl.

No. 4—Watch is under tripod on stage, outlined by pattern rug. Invert picture. Duck is in lower left hand corner when picture is thus held. It is in the portiere back of performer on stage.

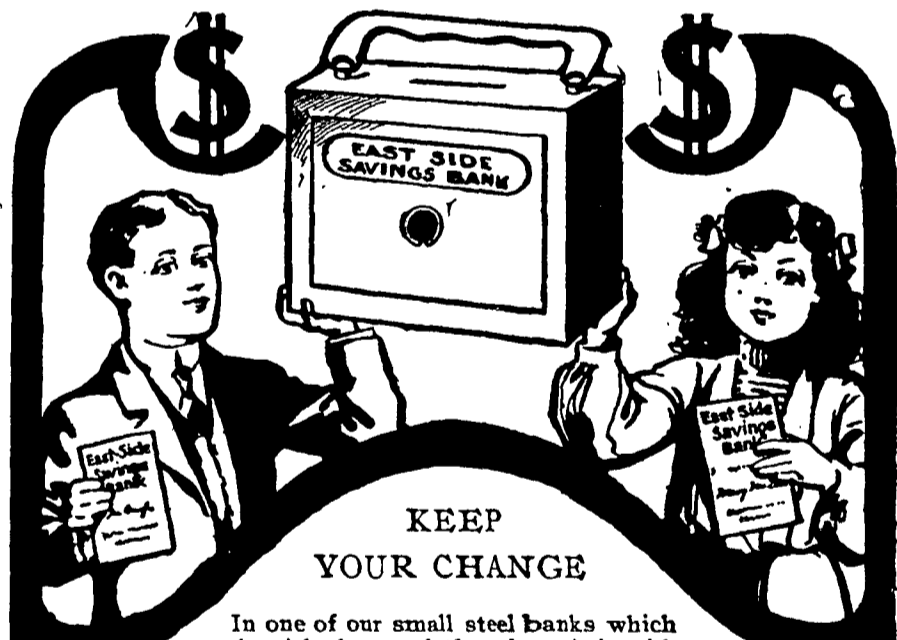
