BUSY MONTH AT ST. MARY'S.

Ambulances Responding to Ninety Five Calls During September.

September was a busy month for St. Mary's Hospital, the ambulances responding to 95 calls, 80 of which were hurry calls. The highest previous record was 90 calls, in April of this year. The highest daily record was also made in September, the ambulances answering ten calls on September 24.

The Hospital News, published in the interest of St. Mary's, shows there were 117 patients in the hospital on September 1; 126 were admitted during the month, there were 4 births, 11 deaths and 101 were discharged, leaving 134 patients in the hospital on October 1.
