Five Minute Sermon

The Ruler's Daughter.

The dead girl represented a soul recently fallen into mortal sin through frailty, surprise, or the violence of temptation, rather than malice or depravity of heart. On this account Christ said that she was not dead, but asleep. God ordinarily by His mercy calls souls suddenly, principally by a great remorse, to a sincere repentance and a prompt return to the state of grace, and the time of their spiritual death being of short duration, they may be said to be asleep rather than dead.

The lesson we should learn is to have recourse to Jesus Christ in all our needs with a lively faith and with humility, as had the ruler and infirm woman. We should also admire the great goodness of our Divine Redeemer who was so prompt to console those who asked Him; He will do the same for us if we ask Him from our hearts, and, as our Divine Master sent away the musicians from the bed of the dead girl, so we on the occasion of death should seek help for the soul, and not the noise and clamor and the vain pomp of the world.
