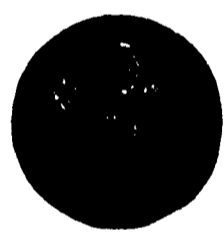

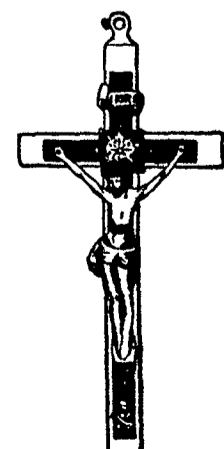

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APOSTLESHIP OF PRAYER.

Origin and Spread of the League of the Sacred Heart.

The League of the Sacred Heart is the largest and most widely distinguished Roman Catholic organization in the world. The league, or, as it is sometimes called, the Apostleship of Prayer, seeks to promote the glory of God and the salvation of souls by prayer and good works. Its members in every part of the world bind themselves to the exercise of certain acts of piety which are offered up collectively for the general good of the association and in reparation to Christ for the sins of men.

The Apostleship of Prayer was founded at Vals, in France, in 1844 by Rev. Francis Xavier Gautrelet and was first intended to cultivate an apostolic spirit in the young Jesuit students who were there preparing for the missions. Extended by them to the villages, convents, hospitals and other institutions in that neighborhood, in which they were teaching catechism or preaching, it soon spread throughout France and was shortly after propagated in the foreign missions and in other European countries where these young men were sent by obedience or persecution. Identical in spirit and in its essential practice is the Apostleship of Prayer as it now exists.

Father Gautrelet's foundation was organized and perfected by Rev. Henry Ranzere, who gave the society new vigor and founded the Messenger of the Sacred Heart, which was soon reproduced in several languages.

Plus IX had already granted the association many indulgences. In May, 1870, Leo XIII. confirmed the work in substance and perfected it in form by revising its statutes. At present there are about 80,000 local centers in every part of the world, combined in the Apostleship of Prayer, and it is estimated that 35,000,000 persons take part in its practices. Of these at least 6,000,000 are associates of the 5,500 centers aggregated in the United States.

Spiritual Communion.

When present at the holy sacrifice it is well to follow the mass as far as one can and unite one's self to the action of the priest rather than to occupy one's self with different devotions. Now the priest offers an oblation, recites prayers and receives holy communion; therefore the layman can and ought to do the same. As the priest offers up the Son of God in sacrifice for us, so the Christian ought to make an offering of himself, to adore the word made flesh and to receive the blessed sacrament. As, however, it is not possible to communicate physically, we can awaken in ourselves a desire, a fervent longing for holy communion and beseech our Lord, who is present under the sacramental veil, to come and dwell in our hearts by his grace. The spiritual communion will receive its completion at the conclusion of the mass in the blessing given by the priest. Spiritual communion can, moreover, be made without any limit as to place. When the bell which is rung at the consecration is heard the Christian can awaken in his soul the desire to receive his Lord. The laborer in the fields, the artisan in the factory, the sick man on his bed of pain each and all can say within themselves: "How happy should I be, O my Lord, if I could now adore thee in thy temple and receive thee sacramentally! But do thou at least come and enter into my heart and abide with me, that the darkness may not gather round my soul. Graciously hear me; be merciful unto me. Amen!"

A Public Spirited Priest.

Rev. George Gillingier, secretary to Bishop Cosgrove and chancellor of the Catholic diocese of Iowa, is a young priest who is attracting much attention in the Hawkeye State as the leader of a moral reform movement in Davenport, Ia. Last spring attention was called to the lax conditions in Davenport by the story of Anita Ray, a chorus girl from Chicago, who fled from a music hall to the protection of the police, saying that Davenport music halls were so much worse than those of Chicago that she wanted to go home. An investigation led Bishop Cosgrove to the conclusion that "Davenport is the wickedest city in the country," and a reform movement followed which had but temporary results. This time Dr. Gillingier is heading one that is to have permanent results, as he has assurances that if there is a relapse to old conditions a citizens' movement will follow which will sweep them clean. The better class of saloon keepers organized in support of his demand for midnight closing and other reforms, and public sentiment seems to back him strongly. It is even suggested that Father Gillingier may be made mayor of Davenport in order to carry out his ideas of reform.

Pope Leo's White Dove.

Pope Leo's pet, a white dove, which the holy father used to feed at a certain hour every morning. He allows it in his room, where it perches on his writing desk, and, like Leo, he daily saves some bread crumbs for its food. This white dove was among the last visitors Pope Leo received. On the second morning preceding his death the winged pet knocked at his bedroom window with its beak and when admitted flew upon the bed, walking over the pope's chest and looking into his eyes. With great difficulty Leo laid his hand on the dove's head, petting it gently and whispered a farewell.
