CATHEDRAL.

Palm Sunday was most solemnly observed in our Cathedral Sunday. Right Rev. Bishop McQuaid blessed the palm before solemn high mass at 10:30 o'clock. The solemn procession also took place previous to the mass. The passion was chanted by Revs. M. J. Nolan, D. D. E. J. Gafel and Michael Krieg.

A very successful retreat of the men of this parish closed Sunday evening. Rev. Father McCarthy S. J. who conducted the retreat gave the papal benediction after which benediction of the Blessed Sacrament was given.

COOK OPERA HOUSE.

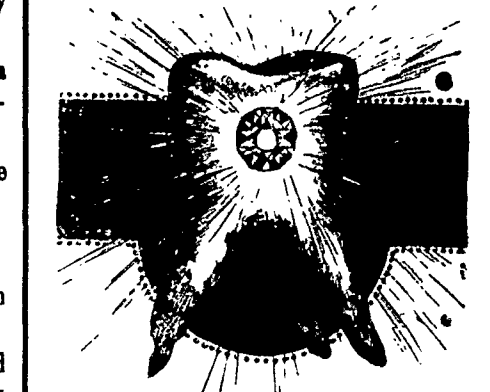
