ANTRIM.—While men were making excavations recently in an old quarry near Glenarm, they came upon a large quantity of human skulls and bones.

The discovery was communicated to the constabulary, who arrived at the conclusion that the remains were those of the 1798 pikemen slain in the struggle which took place in this district.
