FURS IN DANGER.

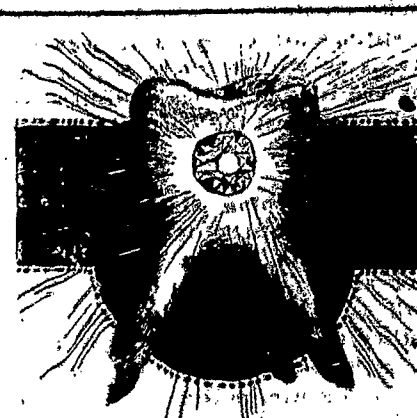
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The little moth is a peculiar kind of insect. The infinitesimal specks or molecules that go to make up life are deposited in the recesses of the fur, and when the first warm days come they awaken gradually into life and soon begin to feed on the small soft fur that lies next to the pelt.
