Sacred Heart Convent. Five pupils of Sacred Heart Convent received their first holy communion Thursday morning.

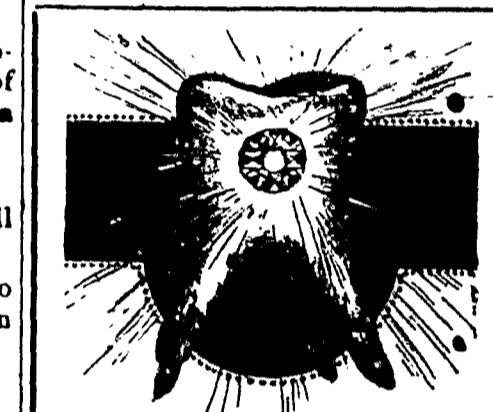
