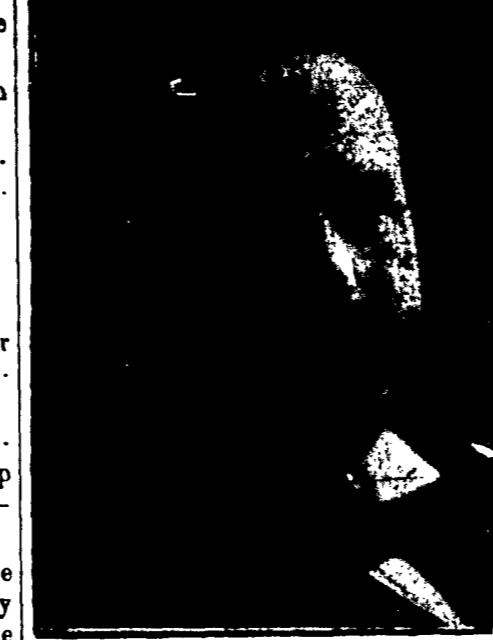
Mrs. W. E. White and daughter, Viola, of Broadway, left Tuesday for the Adirondack Mountains, where they will spend the summer months.
