NINTH WEEK AT CLIFF HAVEN

It may be said that, from one point of view, Cliff Haven's intellectual prestige is now secure. For within the last few days she has entertained in her own royal, cordial fashion, a scholar, whose fame is world-wide—the famous Dom Gasquet, Benedictine Abbot, and one of the world's greatest historians.

Accompanying Dom Gasquet were two other well-known ecclesiastics, the Right Rev. Mgr. James Nugent, of Liverpool, and Rev. M. J. O'Callaghan of Manchester. This was not Mgr. Nugent's first visit to America, nor even to the Summer school.

At a symposium in the Auditorium this week, these two prelates were heard—Mgr. Nugent on the Charities of England, and Abbot Gasquet on the Schools of England. Dom Gasquet during his stay also gave a lecture on Christian Democracy and Parish life in Medieval Times.

The departure of these distinguished guests was an occasion for regret to the members of the school, so pleasant and so full of inspiration was their presence.

"Conscience and Authority" was the remarkably interesting subject of the lecture course given this week by Rev. James J. Fox, S. T. D., Professor of Philosophy in St. Thomas Aquinas College, Washington, D. C. The evening lectures by Rev. Morgan M. Sheedy, the first president of the school, were in reminiscence vein. He took up the growth of the Reading Circle and of the Summer school movements, giving many interesting points of their early history.

Dramatic, vigorous and thoroughly delightful, were the readings given by Miss Mary Canney, instructor in the Academy of Mount Saint Vincent, on Monday and Wednesday evenings. Sophocles, "Antigone" and Shakespeare's "Twelfth Night" were her selections.

Friday of this week is the last day of the thirteenth session, the most successful in the history of the school.—In regard to programme of studies, to attendance, and to social life, it has been a banner year.
