A Diet of Sugar.

One of the numerous physical-oulture teachers departs from the faith of trainers in advising his pupils to eat all the sugar they can get. Bither in taking off fiesh or an putting on flesh his advice is to make sugar, in some form or other, a liberal part of the daily diet. "Sugar is a very powerful cumulant and a great producer of nerve force," he said. "I spent two winters in the Klondike, where the miners eat enormous quantities of sugar and molasses. They even sweeten salt pork with it. Men who simply soak themselves in sweets do twice the work of men who let augar alone. Swiss mountaineers always carry a liberal supply of sugar in their kits. Negroes in the harvest fields grow fat on sugar cane. In hot or cold climates a liberal diet of sugar will put a man in the finest possible condition. Whatever bad effects sugar may have at first are soon remedied by exercise. It has been a fad for two or three years to howl against the use of sugar, but there is no sound physiological reason for it."



A City Without Water.

For instance, a pipe of marsala will contain 93 gallons, while a pipe of madeira will contain just one gallon less, a pipe of port wine, however, is a much more generous measure, and should contain 103 gallons. Hotel proprietors and managers have to make themselves thoroughly familiar with these measures, which vary with every wine -London Tatler.
