## CITY PARISH NEWS

Interesting Budget of Happenings Gathered by Our City Reporters.

### HOLY ROSARY.

The fair for the benefit of the building fund of the church opened auspiciously Monday evening at Fitzhugh Hall. The First Regiment Knights of St. John in full uniform held a parade through the principal streets of the city, and attended the fair in a body. The formal opening was performed by Commissioner of Public Works Thomas J. Neville, a member of the parish. He said the object of the undertaking was to raise part of the \$30,000 necessary for the building of the new church, which is now nearing completion. The speaker said the church was organized in 1889 and the beginning was small and discouraging. Only a few families constituted the membership of the parish at that time. Now there are 230 families and 250 pupils in the parochial school. Much of the prosperity of the parish was due to the untiring zeal and energy of the rector, Rev. J. G. Van Ness.

After Mr. Neville, Father Van Ness delivered a brief address. He thanked the Knights of St. John for their kind assistance on this occasion, and spoke words of encouragement to those in charge as well as to the members of the parish and their friends who were present. Many handsome and valuable donations have been made, and to judge by present indications the fair will be a most successful one.

The committee in charge are: Paul J. Leichter, president; Thomas J. Neville, vice-president; J. J. Hahn, secretary; Rev. John G. Van Ness, treasurer; Bernard J. Eilers, manager.

The funeral of George P. Klipfel, who died in St. Mary's Hospital on Saturday, took place at 8:30 o'clock Monday morning from the home of his mother, Mrs. Stephany Klipfel, 20 Brooklyn street, and at 9 o'clock from Holy Rosary church, where a solemn mass of requiem was celebrated by Rev. J. G. Van Ness. Burial was in Holy Sepulcher cemetery. Mr. Klipfel was 25 years old. He enlisted in the army at the time of the Spanish-American war and saw service in the Philippines as a member of Company 1, 29th United States Infantry. Besides his mother, he leaves two brothers, Albert and Charles Klipfel, and one sister, Anna L. Klipfel, all of Rochester.

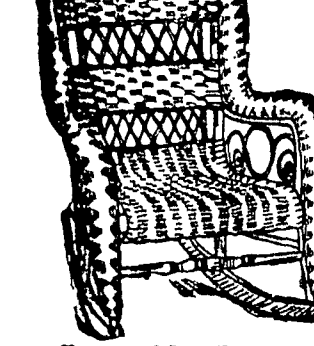
