In accordance with the new rules introduced by the prison's board, the visiting committee arranged that a lecture be delivered to prisoners that voluntarily wished to attend it. The governor having communicated with the prison board, sanction was given. Accordingly the visiting committee, with two of the chaplains, proceeded to one of the corridors, where seventy prisoners were seated. Mr. Morlarty, secretary to the Irish Association for the Prevention of Intemperance, delivered a practical address on the evils of intemperance. The prisoners listened throughout with great interest.
