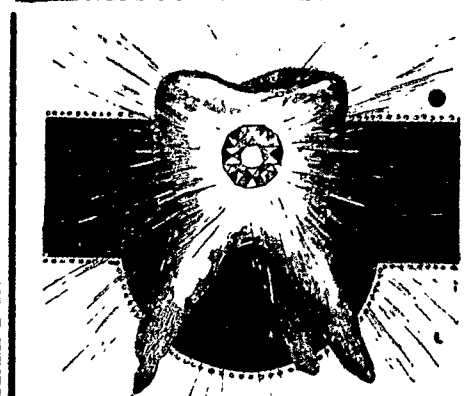

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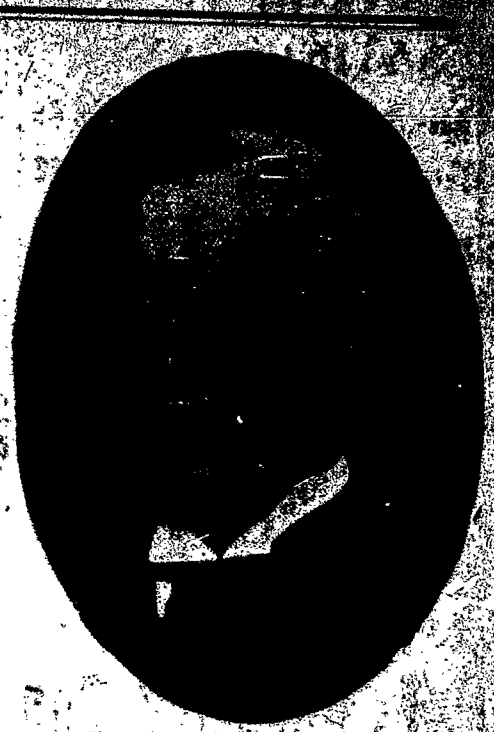

Arrangements have been made for receiving the returns of election in the Club rooms on election night. Members with their friends are cordially invited to be present.

Mr. James Breck Perkins is the Republican candidate for re-election to Congress for a third term. Referring to his renomination, the Buffalo News spoke of Mr. Perkins as follows:

"Mr. Perkins is a profound lawyer, standing at the head of the bar in his section of the state. He is an accomplished scholar and a historian of brilliant reputation. He is an able debater and of original views within rational party lines. He is the soul of integrity and everywhere recognized as a gentleman whose public service would be an honor to any constituency. If Rochester has the wisdom to keep him in Congress until he has moved up to the committed positions that his eminent talents qualify him to hold, she will be sometime represented as influentially as any other part of this state."



The Democrat & Chronicle also spoke of his renomination as follows:

"Mr. Perkins will return to Washington—for there is no question as to his election—a trained and fully equipped representative and legislator. Of Mr. Perkins personally, of his qualifications and record, it is not necessary that we should speak at length in this place. A lawyer by profession, a man of scholarly tastes, a citizen who has identified himself closely with the people and interests of this city and county, a staunch Republican, but not bigoted or proscriptive in his partisanship, and a man of pure character and unstained reputation, he will continue to reflect honor upon himself from his place in the Congress of the United States."

Mr. Perkins is a man free from any bigotry, and it may be interesting to Catholic readers to know that he took an active part in securing just legislation in reference to the property taken from the Philippine friars. We quote a few sentences from his remarks:

"Certainly we all desire that if the lands of the friars in the Philippines are to be taken by eminent domain, fair compensation should be given. I think the Committee have failed to secure for these associations the full protection of the law to which they are entitled. We do not want to have anyone say that the land of any religious association in the Philippines, taken under the guise of compensation, shall finally be taken by a process that amounts to confiscation. Under the proceedings authorized by this bill, the value of the land is to be finally determined by the Judges of the Philippine Islands without any right of appeal. It is our boast that we allow full and free legal rights to every man in this land; no matter what may be his race, his creed or his color. I do not want it to be said that, in an act passing Congress at this session, the right which we secure to all other men, of full and final justice, was denied to the Philippine friar."

In conformity with this suggestion, the bill was amended so to allow an appeal to the Supreme Court of the United States. As the matter was subsequently adjusted by the government, it was not necessary to resort to the courts.

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
