He was educated in our parochial school and then entered the employ of S. B. Roby & Co. and four years ago he formed a partnership with his brother, J. A. Casey, and they conducted a wholesale hardware, iron and steel business at 47 Andrews St. As alderman he was chairman of the law and public safety committee and an active member of the finance, lamps and electricity, public baths and public market committee. He was a member of the Knights of Columbus and Union Club Branch 88, C. M. B. A., Rochester aerie F. O. E., and Division 2, A. O. H. He is survived by his parents, two brothers John A. and Thomas Casey, and one sister, Mrs. McHale.

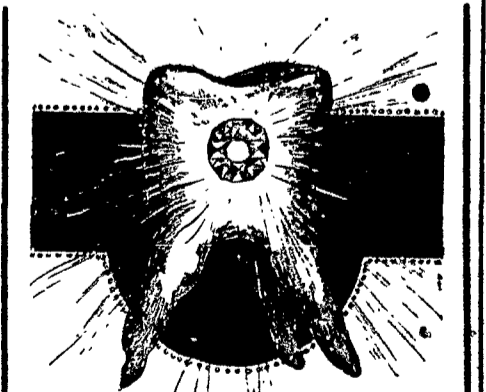
