Father Sinclair thanked the members for their assistance during the past year and hopes that with their hearty co-operation the improvements of the church this year will fully come up to his plans laid out for 1905.

**ST. BONIFACE.**

Father Rauber read his annual financial statement to the people of his congregation on Sunday. The receipts during the year together with the balance on hand Jan. 1, 1904 were \$13,082.87. The larger amounts received during the year were: Pew-rent, \$3,492.67; monthly collections, \$1,070.78; donations, \$3,307.27; school money, \$1,177.85; fair for Home of Aged, \$7,557.90; rents, \$297. Larger disbursement were: Ordinary expenses \$7,787.56; choir, \$502.88; extras \$257.02; amount of debt paid \$5,268.83. Father Rauber thanked the people for their great generosity and told them that the last dollar of their church indebtedness was paid. When he took charge of St. Boniface parish May 1st, 1894 he found a debt of \$26,500. During his pastorate he made \$14,000 worth of improvements.

**In Memoriam.**

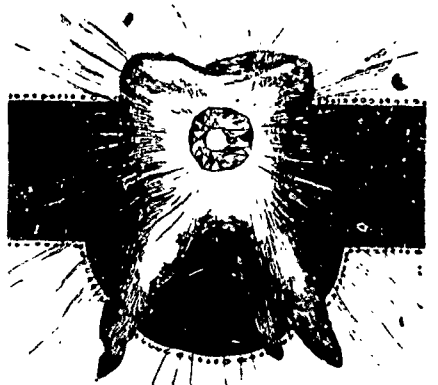
At a meeting of Division 1, A. O. H. the following resolutions were adopted upon the death of Brother Thomas H. Cunningham:
