How a Machinist Kept His Whole House Comfortable. A young machinist bought a tiny cottage and believed that its four rooms could be heated from the cooking range, which had a water-tank attachment. Pipes of hot water were laid and connected with the tank of the range and a radiator placed in each room. An ordinary fire of hard wood was kept in the range and that little cottage was warm and cozy even in the most severe weather of the winter.

The Faculty of Friendship. Not many famous persons have the faculty for friendship in old age as Lord Beaconsfield had it. His passion for mastery, his addiction to mystery were rivaled by his immense faithfulness. While he was at Glasgow to be inaugurated lord rector of the university he heard good tidings of an old associate. "Mrs. Derral and I," he wrote, "were overjoyed and we danced a highland fling in our nightgowns."

Between New York and Pacific Ocean. From New York to San Francisco by water around Cape Horn, the distance is 15,860 miles; the distance in statute miles from New York to the Pacific Coast by the principal land and water routes are as follows: By Southern Pacific railroad, 3,700; by Canadian Pacific railroad, 3,619; by Central Pacific railroad, 3,269; by Northern Pacific railroad, 3,237.

Magnetic Iron in Sand. A curious sight on the coast of Java is a long stretch of shore, about twenty-nine miles in length, where the sand is filled with particles of magnetic iron. In some places it is said that the surface sand contains 80 per cent. of iron. It can be sorted, and a company has been formed to exploit the deposits.

Preservation of Corpses. In recent European experiments corpses have been kept for a certain time in a bath of chloride of calcium heated to 123 degrees, then taken out and steeped for twenty-four hours in a cold solution of sulphate of sodium. The bodies are transformed into perfect mummies, which may be kept indefinitely.

The Primary Colors. The number of primary colors were regarded by Newton as 7—red, orange, yellow, green, blue, indigo and violet. By many physicists only three primary colors are recognized; by Mayer (1775), red, yellow and blue; by Dr. Thomas Young (1801), red, green violet; by Prof. Clark Maxwell (1860), red, green and blue. There are an indefinite number of secondary colors.
