**IMMACULATE CONCEPTION**

Solemn high mass was celebrated on Holy Thursday at eight o'clock, following which a procession to the Repository took place. From eight until nine in the evening, the people assembled to spend an hour of Adoration. Prayers were recited and hymns in honor of the Blessed Sacrament, sung by the congregation. The mass of the pre-sanctified was said on Friday morning at 8 o'clock. The Three Hours of our Lord's Agony on the Cross were commemorated from 12 until 3. Meditations on fit subjects were conducted by Revs. J. Kelly, M. Garvey, P. Neville, J. O'Donohoe, A. V. Byrne, G. W. Eckl and A. M. O'Neill. The new cross donated by the Young Ladies Sodality, was unveiled at this service. In the evening the devotion consisted of the Way of the Cross, veneration of the Holy Cross and a sermon by Rev. Father Dougherty of Canandaigua. The large attendance at all the services spoke well in favor of the people.

The sermon, to-morrow, Easter Sunday, will be delivered by Rev. Father Byrne.

The choir will be assisted by an orchestra. Solemn vespers and benediction at 7:45 p. m.
