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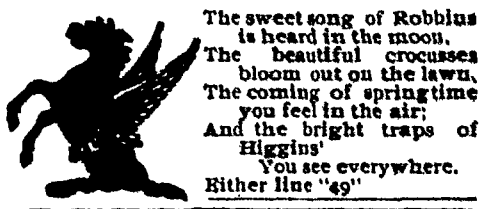
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A Warm Day Forethought

Summer with its sweltering days is not far distant. Time now then to consider the proper appareling. Cloak and Suit rooms are well prepared to meet the demands made upon them in the wash suit line. Never were there prettier fashions to choose from, particularly in the tailored wash suits, than this season presents.

There are shirt waist suits in duck, percale, Persian lawn, cotton voiles and linens. Coat suits in varied styles in heavy linens. Price range is from \$3.50 to \$85.

Shirt waist suits of white lawn—tucked and box plaited waist; nine gored skirt with side tucks ending in foot plaits, \$3.50.

Shirt waist suits of cotton voile—tan, blue and green—shirt waist with tucked panels and tabs with embroidered dots and piped with white; cluster plaited skirt trimmed with embroidered tabs piped with white, \$4.50.

Shirt waist suits of percale—white grounds with stripes, rings and dots of black—tucked waist with fancy yoke effect trimmed with pearl buttons; nine gored skirt with foot plaits, \$4.50.

Shirt waist suits of blue, gray, tan and green chambray—box plaited waist with pipings of white; tucked skirt with white pipings, \$5.

Shirt waist suits of handkerchief linen in white—shirt waist with 1 inch stitched tucks, leg-o-mutton shirt sleeves, finished with tucks and cuffs; eleven gored skirt with stitched side plaits, \$7.50.

Coat suits of white and natural linen—double breasted plaited waist coat with belt, full tucked sleeves, trimmed with large buttons; nine gored side plaited skirt, \$8.50.

Coat suits of white and blue heavy linen—tucked frock and frill jacket outlined with stitched band piped with white; gored skirt with half panel foot plaits, \$12.

Coat suits of oyster shell linen—fitted redingote coat with fly front, trimmed with tailor stitched straps; gored skirt with thirty-three plaits, \$16.50.
