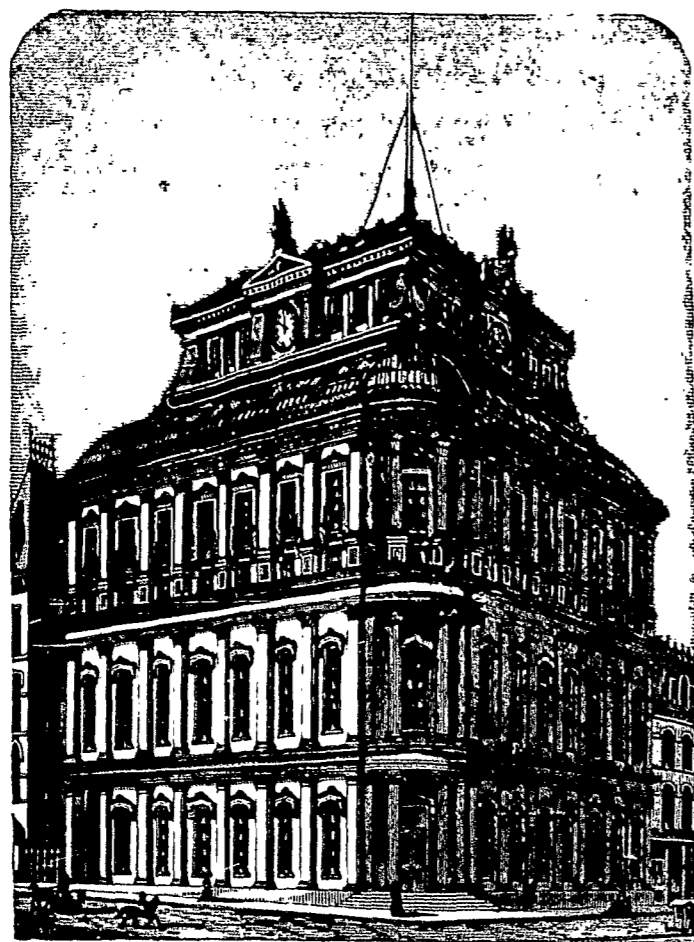

Scenes in the Church.

Along Frank street the procession passed, black and white dissolving into violet and then into purple, kaleidoscopic-like. Turning into Plaza street, the masters of ceremonies led the way to the main entrance to the Cathedral. There the procession was met by Rev. George V. Burns, who, as senior assistant curate of the parish, received the consecrating prelate.

Up the center aisle the priests and prelates marched while the Cathedral choir sang "Ecce Sacerdos" written by Director Eugene Bonn and dedicated to Bishop Hickey.

Arrived at the sanctuary rail, the apostolic delegate, Archbishop Farley, Bishops McQuaid and Ludden, Bishop-elect Hickey, the officers of the consecration ceremony, the bishops and monsignori took seats inside the sanctuary where two chapels had been erected, the

larger one for the consecrator, the smaller for Bishop-elect Hickey. As metropolitan of the province and consecrating prelate Archbishop Farley occupied Bishop McQuaid's episcopal throne on the gospel side of the altar while another throne has been reserved for the apostolic delegate on the epistle side.

The students of St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's sat on either side of the sanctuary in front of the rail while the priests took pews reserved for them. One of the front pews was reserved for Bishop Hickey and mother, his sisters, Mrs. Richard Gasline of this city and Mrs. Joseph Lewis of Middletown, his brother Joseph G. Hickey, of this city, his uncle, Thomas P. Griffin of Chicago, for whom he was named, and three nieces, Mrs. and Mrs. J. J. Gearty, Mrs. H. J. Gearty and Frank Gearty, of Chicago, and Mrs. Joseph P. Gearty, of Buffalo. In the galleries were the representatives of the diocese, and in the rear of the choir, of Rochester and the trustees of the Catholic parishes in the diocese.

The interior of the Cathedral was decorated with festoons of the papal colors, yellow and gold and blue. In the front, with the sun light streaming in the stained glass windows, framed a new and pleasing effect.

After Archbishop Farley and the other officers were seated the solemn service of consecration was begun.

THE CONSECRATION SERVICE.

A Beautiful Ceremony and Its Special Significance Defined.

The ceremony of consecrating a bishop in the Catholic church is a solemn, impressive and beautiful ceremony, but as it is conducted entirely in Latin it is difficult to follow in detail and still more difficult to describe so that the lay mind can comprehend it.

Wednesday, after the consecrating officers had taken their places, Archbishop Farley seated himself in front of the altar. Father Hickey, robed in the amice, alb and chalice and stole of a priest, was

led before the archbishop by Bishops McQuaid and Ludden. After saluting the archbishop, Father Hickey was seated between the assistant consecrators.

After a short pause Bishops McQuaid and Ludden and Father Hickey arose, the latter doffing his biretta and bowing to the archbishop.

Bishop McQuaid, as senior consecrator, said to Archbishop Farley: "Most reverend father, our holy mother, the Catholic church, requires of you to raise this priest here present to the burden of a bishop."

Archbishop Farley: "Have you the apostolic mandate?"

Bishop McQuaid: "We have."

Archbishop Farley: "Let it be read."

Rev. E. J. Hanna, D. D., of St. Bernard's Seminary, the lector for the occasion, at this point stepped forward and in a clear and distinct voice read two documents in Latin. The first set forth that Pope Pius X. had recognized the zeal and fidelity of Father Hickey in the cause of religion by raising him to the dignity of bishop of the titular see of Berenice. The second was in the same form, but made Father Hickey coadjutor "cum jure successione" (with right of succession) to Bishop McQuaid of the diocese of Rochester.

When the briefs were concluded, Father Hickey knelt before Archbishop Farley and recited after him the following oath:

The Bishop's Oath.

I, Thomas, elected to the Church of Rochester, from this hour henceforward, will be obedient to Blessed Peter the Apostle and to the holy Roman Church, and to our Holy Father, Pope Pius X., and to his successors canonically elected. I will assist them to retain and to defend the Roman Papacy without detriment to my order. I shall take care to preserve, to defend, increase and promote the rights, honors, privileges and authority of the holy Roman church, of our lord, the Pope, and of his immediate successors. I shall observe with all my strength, and shall cause to be observed by others, the rules of the Holy Father, the apostolic decrees, ordinances or dispositions, reservations, and mandates. I shall come when called to a synod, unless prevented by a canonical impediment. I shall make personally the visit ad limina apostolorum every ten years and I shall render to our Holy Father, Pope Pius X. and to his immediate successors an account of my whole pastoral office, and of all things pertaining in any manner whatsoever to the state of my church, to the discipline of the clergy and the people, and finally to the salvation of the souls which are entrusted to me, and in turn I shall receive humbly the apostolic mandates and execute them as diligently as possible. But if I shall be detained by legitimate impediment I shall fulfil all the aforesaid things through a designated delegate having a special mandate for this purpose. I shall not give, nor mortgage, the possessions belonging to my mensa, nor shall I alienate them now or hereafter in any manner, even with the consent of the chapter of my church without consulting the Roman curia. And if through me any one shall be deprived of his office, or if any one shall incur the punishment of excommunication or interdict published concerning this matter.

Aid of the Gospels Invoked.

Then Archbishop Farley held the book of Gospels, open in his lap and Father Hickey, still kneeling, stretched out his hands and placed them on the holy text. As he did so, he said "So may God help me and these holy Gospels of God."

To which the archbishop, rejoined solemnly: "Thanks be to God."

Then followed the examinations of the candidate for episcopal honors, made in almost the identical words prescribed by the fourth council of Carthage. These turn upon the duties of the episcopal office and to each Father Hickey responded "I will."

The last question so answered was "Will you, for the Lord's sake, be affable and merciful to the poor and to pilgrims, and all those in need?"

Archbishop Farley concluded this part of the examination with: "May the Lord bestow upon thee all these things and every other good thing and preserve thee and strengthen thee in all goodness," while the assembled bishops and priests answered "Amen."

The archbishop then examined Bishop Hickey in the creed and profession of faith to which reply was made: "I believe." Mgr. Farley admonished the bishop-elect as follows: "May this faith be increased in thee, by the Lord, unto true and eternal happiness, dearest brother in Christ" and again the bishops and priests responded "Amen."

The examination finished, Bishops McQuaid and Ludden led the bishop-elect to Archbishop Farley whose hand he kissed with the reverence due to authority.

The archbishop then laid aside his miter and began the mass which continued in the usual form to the end of the tract after the epistle. Father Hickey who had laid aside the cope and assumed the pectoral cross, assisting the consecrator in tunic, dalmatic and chasuble with stole uncrossed.
