CATHEDRAL.

To-morrow is communion Sunday for the men and boys of the parish. Next Wednesday evening Br. 88, C.M. B. A. hold their regular meeting.

The funeral services of the late Mrs. Elizabeth Quigley Masseth was held Tuesday morning from the Cathedral at 9:30 o'clock. Pontifical high mass was sung by Archbishop Quigley of Chicago, brother of the deceased. Archbishop Quigley was assisted by Rev. Geo. V. Burns, as deacon, and Rev. Michael Kreig as sub-deacon, Rev. Emil Gefell and Rev. John O'Brien, were deacons of honor. Rev. Dr. Goggin was master of ceremonies and Rev. Frank O'Hern and Rev. Dr. Nolan were his assistants. Within the sanctuary were the following: Rt. Rev. Bishop McQuaid, Rt. Rev. Thos. F. Hickey, coadjutor bishop of Rochester; Rt. Rev. Bishop Colton of Buffalo; and Rev. Fathers Connors, Sullivan, Bresnahan, Gleason, Angelo, Golding, Dwyer, Joseph and John Gefell, Eisler, Jones, Kelley, Byrne, O'Neill, Conway, William O'Hern, Doran, Hargather, Ryan, Clark, Canali, J. Petter, O'Connor, Richardson, C.M., Downey, C.M. The choir was under the direction of Rev. Father Petter of St. Bernard's Seminary. The funeral was largely attended by the many friends of Mrs. Masseth in this and from other cities. An escort of ten coaches, conveying the clergy, preceded the funeral procession. The bearers were Judge John M. Murphy of the Municipal Court, John Keenan, J. Henry Murphy, James Maley, James Curtin and O. B. Daly. There was a large number of beautiful floral tributes which showed the high esteem in which Mrs. Masseth was held. Mrs. Masseth was for many years a member of the Cathedral parish, and was always foremost in every good work in the parish.

At a meeting of the members of St. Patrick's parish after the 11 o'clock mass in the Cathedral Sunday morning, it was decided that the parish should begin at once to collect a fund for the building of a fine large hall, and a committee of twelve was appointed to plan this work. The proposal to build met with an enthusiastic reception; a subscription blank was circulated and a number of generous subscriptions were made before the meeting closed. While the plans for the new hall have not been definitely made, the general plan after which it will be built is known. The principal desire of the parishioners is for a spacious auditorium that will be on the ground floor. It is probable that there will be a commodious basement perhaps half a story above ground, in which there will be a well-equipped gymnasium and meeting rooms for societies. The hall is to be built in Frank street, just north of the Cathedral school. It is estimated that the hall will cost \$25,000 to \$30,000.
