Ulster

ANTRIM.—On June 4 the Rev. Peter McCabe died at Glenravel after a short illness.

John Dillon, M. P., and Mrs. Dillon were given a most enthusiastic reception in Belfast on June 6 by the Nationalists. Contingents were also present from the Ancient Order of Hibernians and the National Literary society.

On June 4 the members of the Mountcharles Cumann na n-Gaedheal journeyed by brake and car to Glenties. They left Mountcharles at 7.30 a. m. and had a charming trip over the mountains.

DOWN.—The inaugural run of the motor bus service which Rodford Bros. propose to establish between Newry, Warrenpoint and Newcastle took place on June 3 on a small two cylinder car of twelve horsepower capable of accommodating twenty people.

At the Coisde Ceanntair meeting on June 4, held in Castlewellan, it was decided to give Lower Mourne Croagh leave to hold the opening aeridocht of the season and to request the branches to co-operate in making the fixture a success.

The teams first met at Wexford on Feb. 11, and a grand match ended in a draw, the score being Kilkenny, 5 points, Kildare, 1 goal 2 points. A replay took place at Wexford on Feb. 25, and the referee's award was Kildare, 1 goal 6 points, Kilkenny, 1 goal 5 points.

During the play the referee disallowed a point scored by Kilkenny, which appealed to the central council, and that body upheld the appeal and declared the match a draw, and the Leinster council fixed the present venue for the decider, with M. F. Crowe, who officiated at the previous matches, as referee. There was a tremendous crowd of spectators, and the match was worthy the best traditions of Leinster football. Most Rev. Dr. O'Reilly, archbishop of Adelaide, Australia, lately arrived in Kilkenny on a visit to his relatives. The distinguished ecclesiastic is a native of the city. To mark their joy at having him in their midst several of the residents, including the parishioners of St. John's, where his mother resides, illuminated their houses and the town hall.

KING'S.—Drumkeenan, the pretty little wayside village between Birr and Roscrea, had its first feis lately, when it was the objective of over 4,000 people from the counties of King's, Queen's and Tipperary. Special trains brought leg contingents from Dublin and the south. From every corner of the three counties there were representatives, many of them coming with their local bands and banners, so that when the hour for opening drew nigh the place presented a picturesque and animated scene.

LOUTH.—The annual feis, under the auspices of the Gaelic league of Dundalk, was held on June 4. For the first time the feis was held in the open air, the grounds of the Dundalk Young Ireland Athletic company being used. Favored by delightful weather, the gathering was an exceptionally large one, including visitors from Louth, Monaghan and Armagh. His eminence Cardinal Logue presided during the day and distributed the prizes at 5 o'clock.

MEATH.—On June 7 the marriage of Joseph P. McNally, Kells, to Miss Anna Teresa Boyne, daughter of Patrick Boyne, Monkstown, Mullingar, was solemnized in the parish church, Taghmon.

QUEEN'S.—The death of Denis Deegan, Vico, occurred on June 8.

WESTMEATH.—On June 5 the golden jubilee of the Very Rev. Canon Kearney, P. P., Moate, was celebrated. In recognition of his services to the parish it was decided to celebrate his golden jubilee. Subscriptions collected in the parish enabled the committee to present Canon Kearney with a check for 100 guineas, and the priests of the diocese as well as those of Ardagh and Clonmacnoise, to which he belongs, came together to entertain Canon Kearney at a grand banquet. The nuns and children of the Convent of Mercy, Moate, as well as the blab-wagon also presented him with valuable tokens of their esteem.

WEXFORD.—On June 7, as the man engaged in the erection of the pedestal of the '98 monument in the bull ring were digging an opening for one of the poles, they came across a quantity of human bones three feet under the surface. The discovery was a surprise and does away completely with the theory of some historians that no massacre ever took place by Cromwell on this spot. The bones were replaced by the men.

WICKLOW.—Mrs. Anne Donohoo died at Edward street, Baitinglass, June 3.

On June 1 a frightful motor car accident occurred at Ballymacrow hill, near Ashford, five miles from Wicklow, resulting in the death of Miss Mollie Byrne, aged twenty, residing at Harcourt road, Dublin, and serious injury to the other occupants of the car. It appears that the car, containing J. J. Silke, Dublin, and Mrs. Silke, Mrs. Byrne and Miss Byrne, Harcourt road, Dublin, and the chauffeur, named Chelwood, left Clonska on a tour to the Seven Churches, Glendalough, returning by Ballymacrow. When nearing the bottom of the hill,

one of the steepest and most dangerous in the County Wicklow, the driver lost control and dashed into a wall on the side of the road. The car capsize, its occupants being thrown out. When picked up Miss Byrne was unconscious and was conveyed to a farmer's house, and the services of Dr. Lynch, Wicklow, were requested. He found all the parties suffering from severe injuries. Miss Byrne did not regain consciousness and expired. The car was smashed to atoms. Telegraphing later in the afternoon, a Dublin correspondent says: "Mrs. Silke, another of the party, died from her injuries."

Connaught

GALWAY.—Tenders were considered for the erection of the new premises for the Galway Celtic society, and the tender of Walter O'Flaherty, builder and contractor, was accepted. Mr. O'Flaherty is already at work, and no time will be lost in finishing the contract. The site, which is at Wood Quay, has been given by the county council at a nominal rent. When finished the premises will form a handsome and commodious clubhouse.

Andrew Quinn, second son of William Quinn, of Tuam, died at his father's residence, High street, Tuam, June 8.

LEITRIM.—P. Flynn has been re-elected chairman of the No. 1 rural district council of Carrick on Shannon. John Rutledge was also re-elected vice chairman of the same council.

Mrs. M. Keown, N. T., died at Longford on May 18.

MAYO.—On June 5 Miss Sara O'Malley, daughter of Owen O'Malley, the Octagon, Westport, had the happiness of revealing the habit of religious and of being admitted as a member of the community of the Convent of Mercy, Ballinrobe. Her name in religion is Sister Mary Joseph. Very Rev. James Canon Stephens officiated.

Several laborers cutting turf in a bog near Corick have made a remarkable discovery. Four feet below the surface they found a human head. The local police were communicated with, and on investigation the whole body of a man wrapped in a homespun woolen blanket was unearthed. Underneath was found another woolen wrap. The body, which was clothed in a long coat, lay on its back, with the hands across the chest, as if laid out for burial in the usual way, the head facing the west. The flesh was intact and had developed into a hard substance. The beard and hair, which were of a reddish color, were distinct, and the nails of the fingers were over an inch in length. A flint stone, with tow or wadding, was found in an old tobacco pouch on the body. An inquest was held, and the jury found that there was no evidence to show how the deceased met his death, but the medical testimony suggested that the body had probably lain there for over 100 years, the age of the deceased being about forty.

ROSCOMMON.—At the request of the young men of the parish of Amaduff, Brother W. Skelton, N. P., and Brother C. A. Harvey, D. P., attended lately for the purpose of establishing a division of the A. O. H. They have succeeded in successfully forming a large division. Brother Skelton said that he congratulated the young men of the parish for having come in such a large body to join the order and that this was the largest number of men he ever saw join at the start of a new division. He also said we should feel very thankful to the parish priest, who obliged us with the schoolroom for the occasion. There was also a meeting of the new division held here on June 4. Brother Peter Kerrigan, president, presided for initiation. It was decided to send two members to a meeting to be held at Roskeery for the purpose of regulating affairs with regard to the forthcoming excursion to Sligo. Francis Gaikhan is secretary.

On June 3 James Brennan, residing at Ballyrasna, died rather suddenly.

SLIGO.—On June 5 and 6 Sligo presented a gala appearance, for on those days the Sligo Feis Ceoil association held their third annual festival. The weather was glorious. The feis was held in the town hall, almost all the rooms of which were monopolized by the committee for the competitions. Arches bearing suitable mottoes spanned the principal streets, and the scene when the feis opened was of a bright and inspiring character.

In the courthouse, Sligo, June 8, James Foran, farmer and shopkeeper near Lissadell, dropped dead. The deceased was engaged at the quarter sessions in civil business, and after giving evidence in an undefended civil bill case retired. When passing out he dropped dead in the hall. The deceased had been subject to an ailment of the heart. Deceased's brother was by when he died.

On May 28 a public meeting was held at Sooy to celebrate the victory won with regard to the election of James Flanagan, the United Irish League candidate of Sooy. Shortly after the declaration of the poll the Nationalists, headed by their life and drum band, paraded, and as the league candidate made his appearance loud cheers were given for Mr. Flanagan and the United Irish League. Several arches spanned the road. The arch at Ballygawley bore the inscription, "Hurrah for Sooy and Flanagan!" Several telegrams were received congratulating Mr. Flanagan and the Sooy U. I. L. on being victorious in electing him county councillor for the Collooney division. The Sooy band, with 500, marched to Ballinakil, the residence of James Flanagan, where they were met by the Conways' Cross life and drum band, with 800. The bands, after playing national airs, cheered for the United Irish League candidate. A platform was erected and a public meeting held.
