The C.R.B.A. Council 27 held its regular meeting last Thursday evening in Cathedral Hall.

Each member of the Cathedral congregation Sunday received a copy of a circular letter sent out by the building committee of the new parochial hall, headed by William C. Barry and James L. Whalen. The inadequacy of the present hall is dwelt upon and the members of the parish are urged to subscribe according to their means. Bishop McQuaid has promised \$1,000. or each \$9,000 subscribed by the parish, and Coadjutor Bishop Hickey has donated one-half of his salary as rector of the Cathedral this year—\$450—to aid the project. It is planned to erect a \$30,000 building, 200x90 in Frank street, north of the present school and hall.

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
