At the meeting of the harbor board, Arklow, James Doyle, secretary, said the engineer of the department of agriculture gave him to understand that all the money the department had granted for Arklow harbor was expended in cleaning it up and building the suction dredger under construction in Holland and was expect ed to come to Arklow in November. It was hoped that the extension of the pier which the harbor board required would be carried out. Several mem bers said it was unfair to charge the dredger on Arklow, as it was to be used for other harbors. Hugh Byrne said November would be too late and the department might as well keep it till February, and if what happened last year were not prevented the fishermen would lose the winter's fishing and be prevented from earning their living. However, they (the harbor board, had no control, but could state their opinions and see what effect they would have, for the department was now responsible and was committed to keeping the bar open for the fishing boats and vessels.
