CAVAN .- A sad bathing festality occurred near Limerick c'ty Aug. 31 Two lay brothers, Bernard Cooke, twenty-three, and Thomas Mangan, Redemptorist community. Limerick. went to bathe ut Shannon fields, Corbally. Brother ('ooke was first in the water and while his companion was undressing sank five yards from shore and never rose to the surface. Mangan rushed for assistance, and some men, with Dr. O'Donnell, were quickly on the scene. The body was recovered in five minutes immediately, but all efforts at resuscitation failed. Decensed was a native of Cootehill.

Miss Mary Clarke, Notagh, died Aug. 12, aged thirty-five years.

DERRY.-- A sensation was caused in Orange and Apprentice Boy circles in Derry lately by the intimation that John Alexander, governor of the Apprefitice Boys, had resigned that office. DONEGAL.—The death of James Smullen, Commercial hotel, Donegal, took place Aug. 12.

During the work in connection with the development of the recently discov ered gold deposit at Glentogher the men working for levels made a discovery, coming on an old gallory which had been worked 200 years ago. The gallery admits an average sized man walking upright, and the frame of the doorway is of old black bog oak. The evidences of the gold lode are distinct and satisfactory. During August many mining experts from South Africa and Australia visited the mine, and their re-

ports were encouraging. Charles Green, fish dealer, while going in his donkey cart from Dunfanaghy to Falcarragh to sell fish on Aug. 15 was struck by a car driven by James O'Donnell of Falcarragh. The deceased was thrown out of the cart on the road. When picked up it was found there was a cut on his head. After the collision deceased proceeded to Falcarragh, and while selling fish at the coast guard stätion he fell, became unconscious and died. Drs. MacDonald and Hay made a postmortem examination. They found the cause of death was rupture of a blood vessel in the brain. The coroner's jury held that O'Donnell was blameless.

They give 1714 per cent of an abatement to tenants whose rents were fixed since 1896, this being equivalent to 84. 6d. in the pound, while for tenants whose rents were fixed prior to 1896 there is 271/6 per cent reduction, or 5s. 6d. in the pound.
